A telegram was received on Monday morning stating that Earl Pearson, son of C. E. Pearson, of Pleasant Valley, was drowned at Gardner, Ore., on Sunday. It seems that Pearson owned a boat that went adrift, and attempted to swim to it. While doing so he became cramped and drowned. The body was recovered and taken to Salem where it was buried on Wednesday. Mr. Pearson left here on Tuesday.

The quarterly bulletin of the Oregon State Board of Health gives the births and deaths in Tillamook County for the past three months: Births—October, 3 males and 4 females; November, 5 males and 5 females; December, 3 males and 1 female. Deaths—October, 1 male and 1 female; November, 2 males and no females; December, 3 males and no females. There were 21 births in the three months, 11 males and 10 females, and there were 7 deaths, 6 males and only 1 female in three months.

County Judge Homer Mason and County Commissioners F. L. Owens, and Geo. R. McKimens and County Clerk J. C. Holden took a trip to Bayocean on Saturday to look over the road situation. This was the first time that the two county commissioners had seen Bayocean and they were surprised at the amount of permanent improvements made there and the large amount of concrete roads and pretty bungalows. They were taken over the natorium and the hotel and saw the improvements that have been made there. To connect with the proposed county road, the Bayocean people have one piece of road to finish.

Willamina Times: "A vigorous protest is being made for the abolition of the present Grande Ronde road and the establishment of a state highway via Bently. Four petitions bearing

many names, and addressed to the Yamhill county court, are being circulated. Delegations of citizens interested in this road went to McMinnville, Dallas and Tillamook to present their side of the argument to lay the case before the courts for their careful consideration. They emphasized the fact that the road will serve more people, that it can be built much cheaper, that it will be no farther and that the grade via Sour Grass to the Nestucca will be lighter than the other proposed route."

The Executive Board of the Tillamook Commercial Club met on Tuesday evening, and owing to the attack made on Secretary Worrall by the Herald this matter was taken up. The Board thought the attack uncalled for and will ask Mr. Trombly to retract what he said about the secretary. Mr. Worrall wanted to resign from committees he is on, but the Board would not accept his resignation. Mr. Worrall has done a great deal of hard and successful work for the club, placing it in good financial condition, and a large number of the club members have signified their intention to stand back of Mr. Worrall and the club on account of this unjust attack upon him.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

J. A. Roberts Struck By Line and Hurlled Twenty Feet.

A fatal accident happened on Thursday at the logging camp of the Coast Driving and Boom Company, on Sutton Creek, when J. A. Roberts was fatally injured. The large donkey engine, just installed at the camp, was being moved and Roberts was standing in a dangerous position between the bite of the steel cable. As he wire rope jerked back it struck Roberts in the stomach and hurled him twenty or thirty feet. The body struck a log and injured the man's head, rendering him unconscious. He was brought to the city and placed in the hospital, where Dr. Boals did everything possible to save the man's life, but he died at three o'clock Friday morning.
