

COUNTY COURT DOINGS

Ordered Survey of the Dolph Road.

The County Court composed of County Judge Homer Mason and County Commissioners F. L. Owens and Geo. R. McKimens, was in session last week and transacted the following business:

In the matter of the continuation of the survey of the Dolph road it was ordered that R. L. Shreve, county surveyor, J. M. Baker and Forrest J. Ayer be appointed as a Board of County Road Viewers, to make a survey from the Peterson place by way of Baxter's to the county line between Tillamook and Polk County to connect with the survey made by the Polk County Board of Surveyors at Bear Creek; also to run a line by way of the Baxter place up the Sour Grass creek, to connect with the present road, at or near what is known as the Bee ranch.

In the matter of bids for moving houses at Ocean Lake Park, the bids of C. W. Ross, W. T. Kimbell, and A. J. Zimmerman were rejected, and that of the Tillamook Bay Construction Co., for \$145.00 was accepted.

Bond of J. M. Baker, as road supervisor was accepted.

In the matter of deed of F. R. Beals for a county road at Sea View Park the same was accepted.

In the matter of the claim of Jonas Olson, for cattle slain under direction of Dr. J. E. Reedy, this was continued until the March term; and the claim of Walter Severance for cattle slaughtered was allowed in the sum of \$25.

In the matter of the petition of P. W. Todd and David Martiny for refund of taxes, the same was continued.

In the matter of the petition of Geo. Loerpel, for vacation a portion of what is known as the Loerpel road, R. L. Shreve, county surveyor, Alva Finley and Albert Eason were appointed as a Board of County Road Viewers, to meet at Mohler on Feb. 13th and to report at the next regular term of the court.

The court allowed the bill of \$1300 for the publication of the delinquent tax list. The cost of publishing was some larger than was anticipated because of the fact that the list was nearly twice as large as heretofore. However, the papers did the publication for a little more than half the rate which the law allows.

Death of Mrs. Wm. G. Tait's Mother.

Mrs. Salanda M. Sawyer, wife of former Senator Lewis M. Sawyer of 1031 Maple avenue, died last Monday afternoon at her home in Evanston. She and her husband had lived together for over fifty-five years and reared a family of eight children, consisting of four sons and four daughters, the youngest of whom is 35 years of age; they have ten grandchildren and Mrs. Sawyer's death is the first death which has occurred in their family in the fifty-five years since their marriage, they having never lost a child or grandchild in that time. Mr. Sawyer is retired from business and for many years their time has been divided between Evanston and California.

Mrs. Sawyer's parents were pioneers in northern Illinois and were prominently identified with Livingston and La Salle counties, her father, Albert Moon, having come from Ohio in 1823 and settled in the place which was subsequently named after him on the Santa Fe railroad. Her parents in the early days lived among the Indians and sometimes sought protection in the forts, and her father was active in the Black Hawk war. It is interesting to note that in those pioneer days in the absence of inns prominent settlers were accustomed to entertain guests in a patriarchal way, and Abraham Lincoln and David Davis were among those entertained at their home, and as an interesting sidelight on the life of those early days, in gratitude for the hospitality extended to him, the future president insisted on gathering and preparing for the table the vegetables and fruit provided for his entertainment.

Their children are: Mrs. Elmer E. Ames of Topeka, Kan.; Mrs. David H. Bloom, of Chattanooga, Tenn.; Charles M. Sawyer, governor of the Federal Reserve bank of Kansas City, Mo.; Ward B. Sawyer, a practicing attorney of Chicago; Commander Frederick L. Sawyer (retired) of the United States navy; Mrs. Wm. G. Tait of Tillamook, Ore.; Mrs. Stevens A. Coldren of Kansas City, Mo.; and Robert B. Sawyer of Chicago.

Mrs. Sawyer will be buried Thursday, January 21, in Riverside cemetery, Streator, Ill., near her former home.

Quite a few people met Mr. and Mrs. Sawyer when they were here a few years ago on a visit at the home of their daughter Mrs. Wm. G. Tait. Mrs. Tait is now at Evanston.

Death of John Guest.

John Guest, father of W. H. J. Guest, merchant of this city, died at the Boals' hospital on Sunday night. Deceased had been operated on for cancer of the neck. The operation was successful and the wound healed nicely, but after the third day he weakened and gradually sank away, not being able to stand the shock.

The funeral service was held Tuesday afternoon in the Masonic Hall, Rev. F. O. Jones of the Episcopal Church officiating. Interment took place at the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Deceased was born in England March 20th 1839. He was married to Valentina Finch at the age of 20 and at the age of 30 he came to America. He resided for many years in New York state and for a time in Michigan and Alberta. He has resided for four years in Oregon. He leaves three sons and two daughters. He also leaves a brother at Bayone, New Jersey. He had been in Tillamook but a few weeks, his son having brought him here from Portland. The Guests have the sympathy of many friends in their bereavement.

TILLAMOOK COUNTY FAIR

Fair Board and Superintendents Meet at Commercial Club.

The meeting of the County Fair Board composed of J. H. Dunstan, President; L. M. Kraner and Wm. G. Tait, secretary, together with the superintendents and others interested in the Fair, was held in the rooms of the Commercial Club, Tuesday afternoon. It was an interesting and profitable meeting, much progress being made in preparing the new premium list.

President Dunstan, who is taking the active management of the Fair, spoke as follows:

"We all know the object of this meeting as advertised; to revise the premium list, and discuss ways and means of improvement. It is up to us to take the lead in making the best Fair Tillamook County has ever had. In years gone by, the ordinary County Fair or 'Pumpkin Show', was regarded as somewhat of a joke; where the greased pig was one of the greatest attractions. The Pumpkin Show continues to be a feature, but many other features have been added, especially of an educational nature. In fact, it has been said that the County Fair is an educational institution, second only to our public schools. The school exhibits are of the greatest interest, giving the children an opportunity to show what they can do.

"The men who introduced the law making County Fair Boards realized, that the moral and physical health of the people depended upon intelligent occupation. They made it the duty of this board to use their efforts in the upbuilding of all the industries of the county.

"It is our desire to make this Fair in its completeness, an expression of the life of the people; the industrial life, the pleasure life; and the greatest event of the season, where all desire to come and spend the week with pleasure and profit. You all worked loyally to make the Fair the success it was last year despite the fact of the bad weather.

"At the Oregon County Fair Conference, held last week at Corvallis, I had the honor to represent the Tillamook County Fair Board. We had a splendid meeting, hearing such men as Dr. Rebec, of the University of Oregon, Dr. C. H. Chapman of Portland, and Mr. Dana, that forceful speaker and writer of the Oregon Journal; as well as many other prominent in the school and fair work of the state. We all joined in the discussions and for me I must say that I received many good ideas and helpful suggestions, which I am treasuring for our use in the Fair work. One of the important objects of our meeting was to unite on a uniform basis to standardize our exhibits under an official classification. I filed an application for judges in all our departments and have them promised.

"I also met the Holstein and Jersey men and have plans under way to hold a sale of Jersey and Holstein cattle at the Fair.

"The success of the Fair rests largely with the superintendents of the several departments; my service is at your disposal at any time, in all necessary efforts, to make the 1915 Fair one that is worthy of the Blue Ribbon County of the first district of Oregon."
