

In the first place do not place your potatoes this year in the same ground that ground and use a new piece for the potatoes. In the second place, gallons of water, for two hours. Each summer the farmers have complained they cannot obtain sufficient workmen, and the government this year expects to serve both the unemployed and the farmer by keeping in touch with the farm labor situation and suplyinpg men where they are needed. All postoffices in the large cities

will have a supply of application blanks for city dwellers, who are willing to go to the farms, and the blanks for employers will be sent to the small offices. When the blanks are filled out they are sent to the post office department to the United States Department of Labor, which will supervise the placing of the workmen.

Though the movement is primarily to take care of the farm labor it is not limited strictly to that work.
