**Editorial Snap Shots.**

Certainly times are changing for the better. It is only a few years since one term of the circuit court a year was necessary. It was slow business for litigants and criminal cases. Next week the court will start in with three terms—March, June and December.

One bill that passed the legislature was to reduce the scalp bounty on gophers and moles in this county from 25c to 5c per head. The county court made no provision in the budget to pay bounty on these pests, but we think that the dairymen will agree with us that a determined effort should be made to exterminate gophers and moles. Even at the small sum of 5c a head we hope the county court will find some way to pay this amount and not wait another year before this money can be obtained through the budget.

If the Wheeler Reporter is correct in stating that District Attorney Goyne discriminates against Nehalem and Wheeler in enforcing the law against card playing and dice shaking in favor of Tillamook, there is good reason for complaint. The law makes a distinction between localities. It's up to Mr. Goyne to "clean up" his home town.—Nehalem Times.

The snap shot man would like to inform the Reporter and the Times that there is no law that prohibits persons from card playing and dice shaking. It is a violation of law, however, when it is done for money, drinks, etc. Some persons are so narrow in this respect that they want to prohibit small prizes given at private card parties, but will trade at stores where they give trading stamps and other like devices in vogue to obtain business.

We are somewhat disappointed that the State Legislature did not wipe out more of the commissions, which came into existence under the West administration, and put a stop to the wasteful manner in which the taxpayers' money is used to maintain a little army of tax eaters in office. If it is necessary to have a commission form of government for State affairs, then let the governor, secretary of state, treasurer and attorney general constitute that body, for it is too expensive to have a commission for every little thing. We feel certain that if the matter was referred to the people every commission at Salem would be knocked out, and the tax eaters would be looking for other jobs. It is safe to say that public sentiment will be aroused the next two years against commissions that the next legislature will not scruple in wiping out. This much can be said for the legislature just adjourned, that it made a start in the direction and no new commissions were formed, which is some satisfaction.

The snap shot man believes it was wrong for the state legislature to create a judicial district of Washington and Tillamook counties, and that it was an unnecessary expense upon the taxpayers. In fact, as far as Tillamook county was concerned, there was no demand or need of this change. A few years ago two judges did the business of Marion, Linn, Yamhill, Polk and Tillamook counties, and they had plenty of leisure time. At the general election last year H. H. Belt was elected circuit judge of Yamhill, Polk and Tillamook counties by the people, and regardless of this, a bill is railroaded through the legislature to join Tillamook with Washington county for a new judicial district. If there had been any demand or necessity for such a move from this county it would have been different but there was not. This will relieve Judge Belt of part of the work he was elected to perform. We hope the bill will be referred to the people, who, we are sure are opposed to the creation of so many new offices and new tax eaters.

**Is There a Corner?**

The United States attorney at Chi-

ago who has undertaken to find out how much wheat there is in the country, and who owns it, is on the right track. Good judges in that market believe that we still have an exportable surplus of 100,000,000 bushels. The contention that wheat is largely held by farmers is not very well supported, for even at the high price now prevailing the receipts at primary markets are not large. If we have any such exportable surplus as is claimed, the probability is that it long ago passed by contract into the possession of millers, bakers, agents for foreign governments and speculators.

That wheat is either actually or artificially less plentiful than the statistics seem to show is proved by the violence of the recent advance in prices. The rise in one day of 9 1/2 cents for real wheat was explained by a mere rumor that the Italian Government had purchased 1,000,000 bushels of real wheat. On the strength of this report speculators dealt in 14,500,000 bushels of imaginary wheat. If a reported sale of export of 1,000,000 bushels of wheat, not confirmed, adds nearly 10 cents a bushel to the value of real wheat and nearly 9 cents a bushel to wheat delivered in May, what would be the behavior of the market if it were found that Great Britain and France had actually bought 25,000,000 bushels of real wheat and that it was on its way to the seaboard?

Unless wheat is cornered, it should respond to present prices. Farmers as a rule are in no position to hold out for \$2. Even speculators who have no wheat do not hesitate to commit themselves against such a price. The crop was the largest ever grown in this country. Yet the real wheat is not forthcoming and the visible supply does not increase. Famine prices for bread mean trouble for many people. Unless they are justified by dire necessity, they ought to mean trouble for those who are responsible for them.

How much wheat is there in the United States? Where is it? Who owns it? If there is a corner, is it engineered by Americans or by foreigners?—New York World.

**The Wolf in the War.**

Two announcements made to the British House of Commons can fairly be considered together in reaching conclusions. The chancellor of the exchequer, Lloyd-George, said that the allies have as yet thrown only one-third of their military strength into the field against Germany, and that to maintain this force, and to bring the other two thirds into action will cost \$10,000,000,000 during the current year. Great Britain, said the chancellor, can finance the war for five years from her investments abroad, and France can do the like for three years. First Lord of the Admiralty Churchill announces that the plan of shutting out food stuffs from Germany would be strengthened. Churchill declared that "Great Britain had decided to clamp on every ounce of sea pressure to choke off Germany's food supply, in retaliation for Germany's submarine policy." Both of these announcements were almost coincident with the decision, at a cabinet meeting, to continue the policy of "starving out" which Great Britain has adopted.

There are men and money with which to continue the war. The allies, says the British chancellor, have not nearly begun exhausting their resources in either. What they are proposing, however, is the carrying of deprivation and destitution to the homes of an enemy country. The wolf at the door must now be counted as one of the allies in a quadruple entente, surpassingly rich in men and means, fully equipped to carry the war to some legitimate conclusion, but bent upon carrying it to non-combatants, as a means, we must presume to bringing it to a speedier end. Certainly no other place of justification can be offered for such a course, and this one, it may be said in advance, is one which will make no appeal to the conscience of the civilized world.

**To Poultry Breeders.**

Several of the breeders of poultry in this county have asked that a County Poultry Breeders Club be formed, and with that end in view a meeting of all interested is called for next Saturday, February 27th, at 1:30 p.m. at the Commercial Club rooms, Tillamook.

Professor Dryden, who developed the world's record layers at the Oregon Agricultural College, is expected to be here at that time and will take up not only the breeding of fancy poultry but the development of the "egg habit" in our farm flocks. The subject of co-operative marketing will also be discussed. Everyone interested is invited and urged to be present and to bring a neighbor.

**Connecting Links.**

With the State Highway to the coast an accomplished fact the next thing of importance will be the building of feeders or connecting links of roads to the various settlements that will give them access to the main thoroughfare and by that, with the outside world.

One of the rich sections that will be opened up for settlement will be the Salmon River country. Just where the road will connect must be determined by men more familiar with the topography of the country than we are, but it should be on an easy water grade with a view of a permanent road. No matter where the State Highway may go it will bring the good roads nearer to this section, and so make possible the building of better roads to intersect the main thoroughfare.

Another important link in the chain of development will be the construction of a road down the Little Netucca from Baxters to Meda. This road is not a difficult one to build so it can give an outlet to Southern Tillamook for part of the year. By cutting down a few of the worse grades and rebuilding a couple of bridges this road will make a good summer road, but it will eventually, have to be
