Tillamook Oyster Shells May Be Utilized for Lime. *

At intervals the question is revived of making use of the beds of oyster shells that occur in many places about Tillamook bay, Coos Bay, Netarts Bay and other shore points, as a source of lime. A bulletin just issued by the State Bureau of Mines says: *

"The shells themselves are practically pure lime carbonate in composition as are good grades of lime stone. If they can be obtained free from the sand and mud that usually accompany them, and in sufficient and accessible quantities shell beds may serve as well as any other source to supply lime for fertilizer or cement manufacture. The bulk of such beds is apt to be comparatively small however, and as they are usually found, the shells are usually filled with sand and clay impurities to get rid of which economically is apt to be difficult."
