

Big International Exposition's Amusements Novel and Wonderful

President Wilson Will Visit Panama-Pacific Display of Nations via Panama Canal—Vanderbilt Cup Race and Grand Prix Will Be Held In San Francisco.

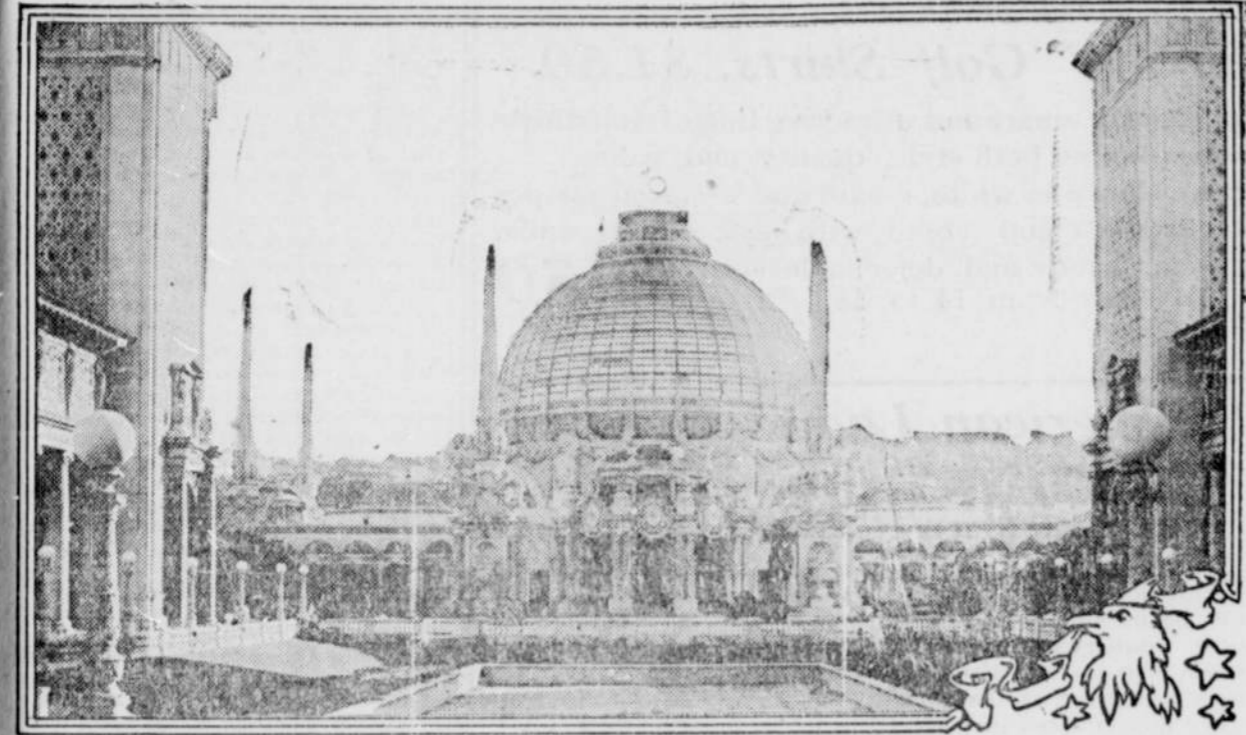
WONDROUS and novel amusements, parades and pageants of the oriental countries, auto and yacht races and athletic contests will be observed upon a scale of unexampled magnitude and grandeur at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. The extensive participation of China, Japan, Siam and Indo and Cochin China, when taken in connection with the plans already made and with the interesting oriental population of San Francisco, assures such spectacles as have never before been seen in the occident. Pageants of miles in length set off by wonderful floats and marvelous pyrotechnics will wind through the streets of San Francisco.

There will be held throughout the

this event. The famous Salt Lake Mormon choir, the deep toned plaintive singers of Hawaii and even a chorus of fifty Maorian singers will take part in the choral events. At an expenditure of \$1,250,000 the Exposition has constructed a great Auditorium in the civic center of San Francisco, which will be used by the great conventions and song festivals. Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Crane will present their latest topspherical novelty, the "Exposition Tango." Mr. Harry Lauder will sing the Exposition ballad.

The amusement section of the Exposition, the "Zone," corresponding to the famous "Midway" at the World's Columbian Exposition at Chicago, will carry out the purpose of the Exposition to give every feature a high educational value.

continental railways. The Grand Canyon concession is built upon so prodigious a scale that visitors will view the cuttings from a standard gauge railway coach running on a standard gauge track. A huge working model of the Panama canal is so extensive that visitors seated in comfortable theater chairs will be carried along the route of the canal upon a movable platform, and a dictionary at the arm of each chair will describe each scene as it comes into view. A novel amusement feature will be provided by working submarine boats of sixty-five tons displacement, which will operate in an artificial lagoon. The Aeroscope, a huge inverted pendulum, operating like a giant seesaw, with a great balancing weight on the short end and a car for passengers at the extremity of its long-

Palace of Horticulture, looking through the Court of Palms. This beautiful structure has a glass dome 185 feet high and 152 feet in diameter. Crowning the dome is a huge basket. The general style of the architecture is the French renaissance, with Saracenic modification. The extreme length of the palace is 672 feet and breadth 320 feet.

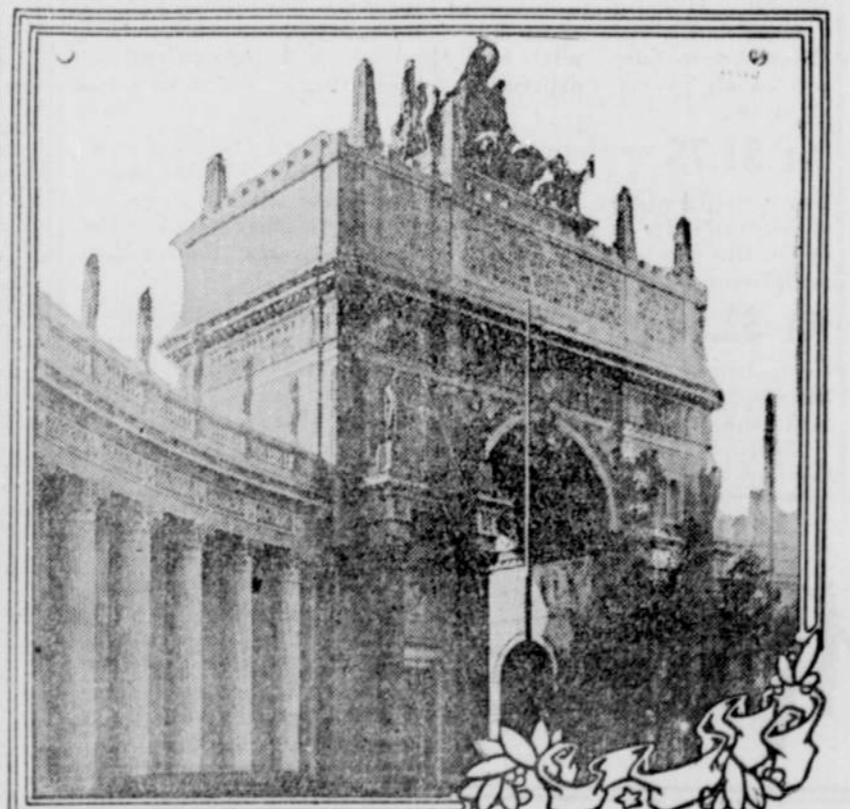
entire period of the Exposition, which opens Feb. 20, 1915, a series of great events, including sports and athletic contests of many kinds conducted upon a scale of great magnitude.

The Vanderbilt Automobile Cup Race and the Grand Prix, the two supreme events of the automobile year, will be held upon a four mile course, embracing a circuit of the Exposition palaces, a spectacular background far exceeding in beauty and grandeur any which ancient Rome beheld during its historic chariot races. The Vanderbilt Cup Race will take place on Feb. 22, 1915 and the Grand Prix on Feb. 27, 1915. Great motorboats of the deep sea cruiser type will race for a \$10,000 prize from New York through the Panama canal to the Golden Gate. A series of international yacht races in the twenty-one meter class will be held in San Francisco bay. President Woodrow Wilson, Emperor William of Germany and King George of England have each offered trophies in these events. Swimming, water polo, fly casting, canoeing, football, baseball and long distance foot racing are included in a series of more than 200 different kinds of contests. President Wilson himself will attend the Exposition, and it is probable the members of congress will attend in an especially chartered steamer.

Of international interest will be the greatest live stock show in the world's history. More than \$500,000 will be awarded in prizes in a continuous live stock exhibit. Rare and valuable breeds of all kinds of live stock from distant countries of the globe will be shown. Specimens of the famous Chillingham wild white cattle will be exhibited for the first time. With the exception of two specimens at the London zoo, this breed has never been shown outside of Chillingham park, England. These cattle are pure white, with black noses, black tips to the ears and black horns. An international sheep shearing contest will be one of the unique exhibitions.

For the musical events there has been built by the Exposition the magnificent Festival Palace upon the grounds. This is equipped with a wonderful pipe organ, upon which Mr. Edwin Lemare, world famous organist, among other celebrities, will give a series of recitals. The International Elstedford will be at San Francisco complete for \$25,000 in cash prizes. More than 20,000 singers will participate in

Imagine, for the purposes of illustration, the interest, action and novelty of ten great cruises like Barnum & Bailey's combined into a single "great show on earth" and presented at ten times the cost of the single production and an idea is gained of the originality of this section. A total of more than eleven millions of dollars has been expended in its establishment. The concessions, as these less serious features of the Exposition are known, include a great open air panoramic reproduction of the Yellowstone National park and a similar representation of the Grand Canyon of Arizona, presented by two of the transcon-

Arch of the Setting Sun in the west entrance to the Court of the Universe at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. Surmounting the arch is a group of statuary representing "The Nations of the West." In the middle of the group is an emigrant wagon drawn by oxen. Riding in this is the figure of a woman, "The Mother of Tomorrow," and by her side are two children, "The Hopes of Tomorrow." Other figures represent an American Indian, a Mexican, an Alaskan and other American types.

proved shall be liable for full cost or proportion thereof hereinafter mentioned, or making said improvement upon half of the street in front of and abutting upon said lot, tract, or part thereof and also for a proportionate share of the cost of improving intersecting sections of two of the streets bounding the block or tract in which said lot, tract or part thereof is situated, but the said total cost shall be apportioned in accordance with the following plan:

Said local improvement district shall, for the purpose of ascertaining the amount to be assessed against each separate lot, tract or parcel of land, or other property, or part there-

of within said district, be divided into subdivisions, or zones paralleling the margins of the street or streets to be improved, which said subdivision on each side of the street to be numbered respectively 1st, 2nd and 3rd. The first subdivision on each side of the street improved shall include all lands lying between the street margin and a line drawn parallel therewith and extending from said street margin one-third of the distance of the improvement district on that side of the street. The second subdivision shall include the next one-third of the improvement district, and the third subdivision shall include the outer third of the improved district. The different subdivisions to be bounded by lines

drawn parallel with the respective street margins, and the improvement district shall be of the extent which the Common Council shall determine by its resolution establishing the same.

The rate of assessment per square foot in each subdivision shall be fixed on the basis that the special benefits conferred on a square foot of land in Subdivisions First, Second and Third respectively are related to each other as are the numbers 55, 30 and 15 respectively, and shall be ascertained in the following manner:

The product of the number of square feet in subdivisions First, Second and Third respectively, and the numbers 55, 30 and 15 respectively,

shall be ascertained, and their sum taken, which sum shall be divided into the total cost and expense of such improvement the products of the resultant quotient and the numbers 55, 30 and 15 respectively shall be the separate rates of assessment per square foot for subdivisions, First, Second and Third respectively. The total assessment thus ascertained against each separate lot or part of lot tract or parcel of land, or other property within such district, shall be apportioned as the amount to be levied and assessed against each separate

lot or part of lot, tract, parcel of land or other property respectively. Provided, however, that the Common Council may, in its discretion, at the time of establishing any local improvement district, further provide that any portion of the cost of the making of such improvements, or any specified part thereof, shall be paid out of the general fund of Tillamook City.

Shall a measure for the amendment of Chapter VIII, Article XI of the Charter of Tillamook City as proposed by the Common Council of Tillamook City by ordinance No. 287 adopted by the Common Council of Tillamook City on March 3rd, 1915, be enacted?

The proposed amendment mentioned amends the present Charter provisions of Tillamook City by establishing limit of City's indebtedness outside of improvement bonds, at Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.00), leaving the powers of the Common Council subject to the initiative and referendum powers of the people.

Shall a measure for the amendment of Article XIV of the Charter of Tillamook City, Oregon, as proposed by the Common Council of Tillamook City Oregon, by ordinance No. 287 adopted by the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, on March 3rd, 1915 be enacted?

The proposed amendment of Article XVI expressly authorized the Common Council to sell Forty Thousand Dollars of the general bonds of the City to George L. and John A. McPherson at par, with a 3 per cent premium, and to use the proceeds for payment of outstanding warrants of Tillamook City, and construct bridge across Hoquarton Slough on Second Avenue East."

Circuit Court Proceedings.

Adjustment Bureau of the Portland Association of Credit Men, a corporation, vs. A. M. Myers. Action for money. Dismissed.

State of Oregon, vs. Edgar Williams, was charged with cruelty to animals, Attorney Johnson demurred to the complaint which was overruled and the case went to trial. The Judge threw the case out owing to the prosecution failing to properly describe the animals.

A. C. Everson, vs. W. L. Powell. Action for money. This was a case where Everson sought to recover \$500 as commission on a real estate deal, which was tried by a jury, and it failing to agree was dismissed. Attorney Holmes asked for a non-suit which the court agreed to, neither party to recover costs.

E. T. Haltom, vs. P. J. Sharp and Maud Sharp, Action for money. Judgment.

The Mohler Mercantile Co., a corporation, vs. W. H. Brobst and Mrs. W. H. Brobst. Action for money. Judgment by default. Order to sell attached property.

Mary Winona Whaley, and A. J. Whaley, vs. Cecelia Alice Davis, et al Confirmation of sale. Sale confirmed.

Whitney Co. Ltd., et al vs. Beall & Co., et al Injunction. Voluntary non-suit.

F. S. Whitehouse, vs. Calvin S. Black, et al, Foreclosure. Decree for foreclosure and sale of property.

E. C. Lockwood, vs. P. D. Hance and Elizabeth Hance. Foreclosure. Settled and dismissed.

Chas. Kunze, vs. Mary J. Dunstan et al. Foreclosure. Confirmation of sale.

Chas. R. Frazer and Ellis McLean, vs. Karl Grauman, Replevin. Dismissed without prejudice to either party.

M. Abplanalp, administrator of the estate of B. Imdorf, deceased, vs. W. R. Lusby, et al. Foreclosure. Permission granted to file amended complaint. Defendant given until and including Saturday, March 6, in which to answer or otherwise plead.

Ella Sherwood, vs. George Sherwood. Divorce. Default of defendant ordered.

F. R. Beals, vs. Minnie A. Mead and T. P. Mead. Foreclosure. Settled and dismissed.

The Mohler Mercantile Co., a corporation, vs. W. S. Brobst, Action for money. Judgment by default. Order to sell property.

Phillip Fischer, vs. L. R. Maine and E. P. Maine. Action for money. Default and decree entered.

Don Ellis, vs. C. F. Alexander. Action for money. Judgment by default.

Frank A. La Flamboy pleaded guilty, but changed his plea to that of not guilty, on a charge of selling liquor to minor. Case went to trial and after doing so defendant again pleaded guilty and the judge fined him \$250 or 30 days in jail.

E. D. Severance had four indictments filed against him, charged with embezzling money belonging to the Standard Milk Sugar Co., the amounts being \$100, \$150, \$30.40 and \$50.50. On Wednesday the district attorney asked the court to resubmit the case to the grand jury as the indictments were defective in one particular which the court granted.

Victor L. Johnson and A. A. J. Zimmerman were admitted to citizenship.

Sterling Ogg indicted for the decontributing to the lincquency of a minor. Indictment dismissed on motion of district attorney on one charge and on the other he pleaded guilty, and was sentenced one to two years. The judge paroled him.

Arthur Darling indicted on a charge of rape. Jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

Louis Erley indicted for assault with intent to commit rape pleaded guilty and was sentenced to indeterminate sentence, but the judge paroled him.

Jeff D. Matney and Lucy Richards indicted for lewd cohabitation.

Ira C. Smith, vs. O. J. Painter Nolan. Action for money. Directed verdict for plaintiff in the sum of \$234.18.
