### Circuit Court Proceedings.

Circuit Judge H. H. Belt has been kept busy for two weeks with cases in the circuit court, disposing of a number of cases.

The Jury was dismissed on Tuesday with the exception of G. B. Lamb, and including the 13th to answer. This case was set for hearing next Monday, but it is thought it may be taken up before that time. There is quite an array of attorneys in this case the plaintiffs being represented by Attorney H. T. Botts and Attorney Geo. Bagley, of Hillsboro, and the defendant by Attorney Emmons & Emmons, Martin Watrous and J. Frank Shelton (of Sweet and Shelton), the local attorneys being C. W. Talmage and E. J. Claussen.

Viola Mills vs. C. E. McAlpin, Edgar Williams and Peter Erickson is a case to set aside conveyances, which is being heard to day, there being considerable local interest taken in the case.

E. D. Severance indicted on four counts, charged with embezzlement in connection with the Standard Milk Sugar Co., will be tried at a later date to be arranged by both sides.

C. A. Parks, vs. P. J. Sharp and Maud Sharp. Action for money. Voluntary non suit as to Maud Sharp, and judgment in default as to defendant, P. J. Sharp.

E. T. Haltom, vs. P. J. Sharp and Maud Sharp. Action for money. Non-suit as to first two counts. Voluntary nonsuit as to Mrs. Sharp. Judgment against P. J. Sharp as to 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th causes of action.

Jones-Knudson Furniture Co., vs. M. J. Gersoni. Action for money. Settled and dismissed.

Nestucca Valley Bank, vs. Chas. Kennedy. Action for money. Settled and dismissed.

Jeff D. Matney and Lucy Richards indicted for lewd cohabitation. Matney found guilty and fined \$100. Mrs. Richards sentenced to term of 30 days in county jail and the judge paroled her.

### New Suits Filed in the Circuit are as Follows.

W. G. Dwight vs. B. J. Stephens is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover \$240.00 being balance owing for rent.

W. G. Dwight vs. B. J. Stephens, Fleckenstein Mayer & Co. and American Importing Co., asks for damages against the defendants for \$140.00, and that the pretended sale entered into between the parties be decreed to be wholly null and void.

Mina Booth vs. Benjamin W. Booth is a divorce suit. These parties were married in January 1907, and five children were born to the union. The grounds upon which the divorce is sought is cruel and inhuman treatment and personal indignities on the part of the defendant, also that the defendant drank to excess and consorted with immoral women. It is also alleged in the complaint that last August defendant, while intoxicated attacked the plaintiff and used violence toward her, and after this attack defendant told plaintiff that he was going to leave her for good. They separated. Plaintiff asks for the custody of the children, \$30.00 per month for the support of the children and \$100.00 for attorney's fees.
