Fred Kaufman, a nurseryman from Woodburn, drove in from that place, and his experience with the roads in Marion, Polk and Yamhill counties allowed him to make a comparison with the roads in Tillamook. In the three counties he said the roads were horrible, but directly he crossed the county line at Dolph he saw a marked difference, and was greatly surprised to find such fine roads. He said he traveled in four hours as many miles as it took him in ten hours in the other counties.

C. J. Green, of the Railroad Commission, who was sent to this city for the purpose of adjusting water rates, went fishing last week without a license. On his way home Deputy Fish Warden Leach accosted him and asked him to ride to town with him, Green not knowing that he was accompanying a fish warden, related his experience at fishing, when the official asked him to produce his license. Green attempting a bluff and felt his pockets for the license which, of course, he could not produce. When they arrived in town Leach took Green before District Attorney T. H. As soon as the fire was discovered, a front door was broken open and the fire promptly extinguished by the Fire Hose Company and responded to the alarm.

when it arrived on the scene the fire had obtained a good hold on the roof, but it took only a few minutes for the boys to extinguish the blaze. It being a plastered house, it burned slowly. The damage is about \$600, which is covered by insurance.

It is reported that the members of the county grange are advocating a referendum on the act of the recent legislature which created the sixth judicial district comprising Washington and Tillamook counties. It is stated that prior to the passage of the act creating the district, Judge Belt had declared that he could handle all the work in the three counties comprising district number twelve, and that there was really no necessity of the new district. Many members of the Grange and citizens of the counties affected feel that the creation of the new office was made simply to give employment to the friends of the legislators. The fact that a special election will be held this fall for the purpose of determining the will of the people on the liquor bill, will not greatly enlarge on the expense of such an election to include the matter of the judicial district.—Nehalem Valley Reporter.
