

S. B. VINCENT RESIGNS.

State Employ to Become Manager of Bayocean Summer Resort and of T. B. Potter Realty Company.

S. B. Vincent, examiner for the state corporation department, has resigned his position, effective at the convenience of the Governor, to become manager for the Bayocean summer resort and of the T. B. Potter Realty Company. As soon as he is relieved of his present duties he will begin his new work.

Mr. Vincent has been in his present position for nearly two years and was the first man appointed to the office after the department was organized. Formerly he was manager of the Associated Press in Portland. He also served two terms as president of the Portland Press Club, of which he was one of the organizers.

The appointment of Henry D. Schulderman as corporation commissioner, to succeed Ralph Watson, is effective May 1 and it is possible that Mr. Vincent will continue in office until then. A small crop of aspirants has sprung up for his job in anticipation of a change. Prominent among them is Elmer Amidon, secretary of the Republican County Central committee.

Mr. Vincent will head a committee of seven which will handle the Bayocean property of the T. B. Potter Realty Company. In this committee there will be three representing the property owners at Bayocean and three representing the corporation that handles the Bayocean project. The committee, under the leadership of Mr. Vincent, will conduct the development of Bayocean as a beach resort and will advance the project as rapidly as financial conditions will permit.

Tillamook School Notes.

Last Tuesday evening at a meeting of the high school and grade teachers, and the student teachers, Dr. R. T. Boals gave a most interesting and helpful lecture on the causes and prevention of disease. He discussed smallpox and advocated vaccination; he discussed tuberculosis also, and advocated segregation and isolation for tubercular patients.

Wednesday afternoon Rev. Gittins, pastor of the Methodist church of our city, spoke to the high school student body and faculty. His speech was short and pithy. The conclusion was quite unusual and amusing. Visits of this sort are always appreciated and

enjoyed. The track meet of the grades, from the fourth to eighth inclusive, took place at the Stillwell park last Friday afternoon after school. This was only one of a series of meets which will continue to the close of school. The boys were divided into five classes, according to their size. This accounts for the fact that there are several first, second and third places in some of the grades.

Sixth Grade:—Wilbur Kirk first in broad jump, Gerald Stark second, Ewald Schnuelle third; Gerald Stark second in sprint, James Campbell third.

Seventh Grade:—Howard Trout first in jump, second in sprint; Thos. Keys first in sprint, second in jump; Arthur Harris third in jump; Arthur Travis third in sprint.

Eighth Grade:—Sam Riefenberg first in jump, second in sprint; Leslie Conover third in jump, third in sprint; Robert Meyers second in jump, third in sprint; Elwell Erskine third in jump.

Credits were awarded to each person as follows:

1st, 25; 2nd, 20; 3rd, 17; 4th, 15; 5th, 14; 6th, 13, etc.

First place is awarded a blue ribbon, second place red, third place in all events.

The seventh grade has won so far in the series with an average of 27. The grade averages are: 7th, 27; 8th, 22 1-3; 5th, 21 2-3; 6th, 20 1-3; 4th, 19 8-9.

Weather Observer Wanted for Tillamook County.

Mr. E. Harrison, Cashier, Tillamook County Bank, Tillamook, Oregon.

Dear Sir:—Mr. C. M. Terry, cooperative observer at Tillamook has told us that he is unable to act longer for us, and it is desired to secure the services of another reliable person to succeed him. It is assumed that the residents of Tillamook do not want to have the station closed and the instruments moved elsewhere. I am therefore addressing you in hope that you may be able to assist us in getting a new observer. As you know there is no pay attached to the job, but the work is light and pleasant, and requires only about five minutes a day to read the thermometers and rain gage and record the readings. All instruments, forms, blanks, franked envelopes, etc., are furnished by the Weather Bureau gratis, so the observer is not required to expend any money whatever, merely giving his time for a few minutes each day about sunset.

As it is impossible for me to go to Tillamook to secure another observer and believing you are interested in having the weather report for your city published every month in our Oregon Climatological Monthly, this matter has been taken up with you. If we can get another observer to go with the work, it will not be necessary to discontinue the Tillamook station.
