Weather Observer Wanted for Tillamook County.

Mr. E Harrison, Cashier, Tillamook County Bank, Tillamook, Oregon. Dear Sir:-Mr. C. M. Terry, cooperative observer at Tillamook has old us that he is unable to act longer for us, and it is desired to secure the services of another reliable person to succeed him. It is assumed that the residents of Tillamook do not want to have the station closed and the instruments moved elsewhere. I am therefore addressing you in hope that you may be able to assist us in getting a new observer. As you know there is no pay attached to the job, but the work is light and pleasant, and requires only about five minutes a day to read the thermometers and rain gage and record the readings. All instruments, forms, blanks, franked envelopes, etc., are furnished by the Weather Bureau gratis, so the observer is not required to expend any money whatever, merely giving

As it is impossible for me to go to Fillamook to secure another observer and believing you are interested in having the weather report. for your city published every month in our Oregon Climatological Monthly, this matter has been taken up with you. If we can get another observer to go with the work, it will not be necessary to discontinue the Tillamook station.


