County Courts Meet and Discuss Dolph Road Propositions.

County Judge A. M. Hare returned to the City on Tuesday, from McMinnville, where the Yamhill, Polk and Tillamook County Courts had a joint session and took up the matter over the new proposed road at Dolph. Nothing was decided, however, but it seems that Polk county will not partition. Nothing was decided, however, but it and before Yamhill County will consent to do so wanted a little further time to make further investigation as to obtaining rights of ways, and when this is done the County Courts of Yamhill and Tillamook will hold another meeting and decide what is best to be done. Provided that no difficulties are encountered in obtaining rights of way, the Sour Grass route appears to be the one most favored, now that Polk County has practically decided not to join in the proposition. From the survey made of the five miles in Yamhill County, a 2 per cent grade was found, whereas for the mile of new road to be constructed in this county the grade will be 3 per cent. Should a joint road district of Yamhill and Tillamook be formed, the two counties will have \$30,000 to start the work as soon as some plan is decided on. Judge Hare informs us that the county courts tried to get in touch with the Highway commission with the object of obtaining state aid for this road, but they were advised not to go to Salem as the Commission had no funds to help out, and, probably, would not have this year. Judge Hare thinks the Yamhill and Tillamook County Courts will come to an agreeable understanding and the road put in shape this year, for their is a strong sentiment in Yamhill county for the new Sour Grass route.

The Episcopal Mission.

Rev. F. O. Jones, who for the past three months conducted a mission in the Masonic building, will bring these services to a close on Sunday next, and return to Portland, where it will be decided when a permanent mission will be established in this county. That is in the hands of Bishop Sumner, who is going over his diocese before deciding on the future plans, and as he will not be back before the end of April from a trip to Southern Oregon, it will be sometime in May before he can visit Tillamook.

It is hoped that those who are affiliated with the Episcopal church will attend the Easter services next Sunday. Rev. F. O. Jones has proved himself a thorough Christian gentleman since his stay in this city and the bishop may appoint him to this field when final arrangements are made for missions of that church.

City Amendments Carry.

The special city election on Monday to amend the city charter, resulted in all three amendments being carried. The first was to establish the limit of the city's indebtedness, outside of improvement bonds, at \$70,000, leaving the power of the Common Council subject to the initiative and referendum powers of the people. The vote was 79 for and 10 against.

The second amendment authorized the Common Council to sell \$40,000 of the general bonds of the city to George L. and John A. McPherson at par, with a 3 per cent premium and to use the proceeds for payment of outstanding warrants and the construction of a bridge across Hoquar-ton Slough. This carried by a vote of 80 for and 10 against.

The third amendment was to fix the boundaries of improvement districts for improving streets so that the same may be extended further back than 105 feet from the street being improved, to such distance as the Common Council may determine. This carried with 70 votes and 16
