

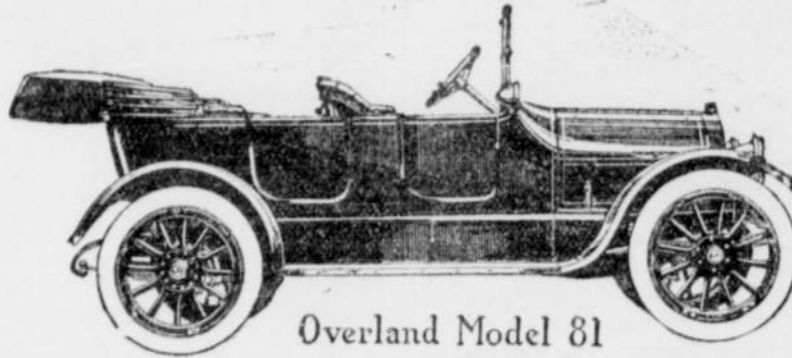

#### Jetty is Deepening Bar Channel.

It is now settled beyond the question of a doubt that the Nehalem jetty will accomplish the desired results in deepening the channel over the bar sufficiently to permit the entrance of large steam schooners into the Nehalem harbor.

Capt. Harry Bell went out over the bar in the Meta M Sunday at low tide especially to make the soundings. He found the channel to be 11 feet deep at the shallowest point.

Soundings made a month previous showed a depth of 10 feet, so there has been a gain of one foot during that time.

Now it must be born in mind that the jetty is extended only half the distance intended, and, as it is extended the channel will deepen still more.

In any event, a channel 16 feet deep is now assured and this permits the entrance of ocean going steam craft to this harbor for good lumber cargoes, and that is the prime object sought to be attained.—Nehalem Times.

the fortune of war and in spite of economic stupidity we are now enjoying, we are rapidly wiping out debt balances against us and placing ourselves in position to finance governments who stupidity has been greater than our own, but on whom fortune has not smiled as much.

In the latest chapter of his interesting reminiscences, Dr. Lyman Abbott dwells on his relation with Henry Ward Beecher, preceding and following his becoming associated with him in the editorship of Christian Union. The publication did not favor church union, in an organic sense. This sort of union had been advocated by its predecessor. Mr. Beecher did not believe this was possible or altogether desirable. His purposes were set forth in his salutatory in June, 1870, in part as follows: "The Christian Union will devote no time to inveighing against sects. But it will spare no pains to persuade Christians of every sort to treat one another with Christian charity, love and sympathy \* \* \* Above all, and hardest of all, it will be our endeavor to breathe through the columns of the Christian Union such Christian love, courage, equity and gentleness as shall exemplify the doctrine which it unfolds, and shall bring it into sympathy with the mind and will of the Lord Jesus Christ, in which great labor we ask the charity of all who differ the sympathy of all devout men whether they agree with us or differ from us."

Every observer realizes that the greatest courage in any war is shown by the women, even as they endure the most poignant suffering. There is one kind of courage that marches into the teeth of death while bugles blow and cannon roar and there is the example of comrades to inspire to reckless heroism. There is another type of courage which enables a woman to restrain her tears and summon a smile of cheer as her loved one goes forth, perhaps to die for his country. It is this courage that is tried by the weary days of anxious waiting, when battles are raging and the dispatches are dealing with victory or defeat and with numbers slain and wounded, without mention of names. There is another anguish when the belated lists of names appear. Perhaps the son, brother or husband is reported wounded. How the woman wishes for the wings of

the morning that she might fly to his side to nurse him back to health and strength. Or perhaps he is reported missing, with all the anguish of doubt that term conveys. Often the heart is clutched by the chill hand of horror, for his name is among those slain at the front. Men fight the battles and spill their blood like water, but it is the women who suffer most from war, apart from deprivations and toll and physical hardships all wars entail.

#### JESS WILLARD IS CHAMPION Giant Kansan Wrests Title from Negro.

Havana, April 5.—Jack Johnson exiled from his own country, today lost his claim to fistic fame as the heavyweight champion of the world, the title being wrested from him by Jess Willard, the Kansas cowboy, the biggest man ever entering the prize ring. Today's fight probably has no parallel in the history of ring battles. For 20 rounds Johnson punched and pounded Willard at will, but his blows grew perceptibly less powerful as the fight progressed, until at last he seemed unable or unwilling to go on.

#### Johnson Grows Weaker.

Johnson stopped landing, and for three or four rounds the battle between the two huge men was little more than a series of plastic poses of white or black gladiator.

So it was until the 25th round, when Willard got one of his wildly swinging windmill right hand smashes to Johnson's heart. This was the beginning of the end. When the round closed Johnson sent word to his wife that he was all in, and told her to start for home. She was on the way out and was passing the ring in the 26th round when a stinging left to the body and a cyclonic right to the jaw caused Johnson to crumple on the floor of the ring, where he lay partly outside the ropes until the referee counted to and held up Willard's hand in token of his newly won laurels.

#### Johnson Not Unconscious.

There is much discussion tonight, and probably will be for a long time, among the followers of the fighting game as to whether Johnson was really knocked out. In the sense of being smashed into unconsciousness he certainly was not put out. The consensus of opinion is that

Johnson expected and knew that there was no possibility of his winning; so when knocked down, he chose to take the count rather than rise and stand further punishment. Johnson has often stated that fighting is a business, and he would not foolishly submit to repeated knock-downs when he had found that he had met his master. A second or two after Jack Welsh, the referee, had counted to, Johnson quickly got up. It was well that he did so, for a moment later a rush of spectators to the fighting platform all but smothered the pugilists. For an instant it seemed as if trouble was threatened but some 50 or more of the several hundred soldiers stationed about the fight arena jumped into the ring and formed circles around the vanquished and victor.
