**Editorial Snap Shots.**

Who were the three persons, judge who were opposed to the Bayocean road?

If some of the timbermen are in favor of road improvements in this county, why are they opposing the Bayocean road?

Wrong again Bro. Trombley. The attack of screwmatics that County Treasurer Beals is suffering from was brought on because of the screwmatic times the people had in raising taxes this year on account of Democratic free trade times, which the people have become sick and tired of.

Commissioner Owens is up and bustling to get road work started in the south end of the county. We'll bet dollars to dough nuts that Frank will have all his road money expended as soon as possible and will have his optics and hands on the money of the other two road districts if the other members of the court don't watch out. Frank is doing what the people want done, and it seems he don't purpose to quibble and dilly dally any longer with work to be done in his district.

Bro. Trombley, who runs the Democratic, free trade mouth organ, said:

"Mr. Baker made a few remarks in his last issue in regard to the difficulty in making collections these days. How about 1907 Mr. Headlight man?"

Free trade not only placed collections on the bum, but since it went into effect more than 500 persons have moved away from the north end of the county, and the lumber industry is still on the bum and mills closed down. There wasn't free trade in 1907, Bro. Trombley, only a little stock exchange excitement.

A petition was circulated asking Governor Withycombe to keep A. C. White, who was implicated in the kidnap case, in the penitentiary the full time he was sentenced to. We can not coincide with the petitioners, for we have some traits of human kindness left in our make up, as well as some Christian ideas in helping a fallen brother. We don't feel like kicking a man when he is down, for, no doubt, long before this White has come to the conclusion that he did wrong. The sentence, anyway, was too severe, for had it not been for the so-called detective in the case, it would have probably never amounted to anything. The petitioners should have petitioned that the detective be prosecuted.

There is only one way to settle the county cruise when any dispute crops up as to the amount of timber, and that is for the County Assessor to employ two reliable cruisers and have the timber recruised. Some of the timber owners have been creating a great fuss about one thing and the other, and as they are not disposed to show their own cruise on their timber the right thing to do is to have the timber recruised where the county cruise show that certain sections should be increased from 25 to 50 per cent. If that is the proper estimate, then some of the timbermen have not been paying their just portion of taxation while other timbermen and other taxpayers have been paying so. As some of the timbermen are running a political machine, courting the support of the voters, are wondering how they

are going to square themselves if their timber should have been assessed from 25 to 50 per cent higher. If that is the case, then the dairymen have been paying more taxes than some of the timbermen.

The counties that have bonded for hard surfaced roads have had more or less trouble with the State Highway officials, and it appears to have caused considerable friction with the local officials and the citizens. We had an idea that this would be the outcome of the state meddling with road work in different counties when it was first agitated, but the only redeeming feature connected with it was making surveys that embraced several counties. Although this county has had to pay money into the State Highway Fund, not one cent's worth of State aid has this county received. We have sufficient confidence in our County Court handling the road work of Tillamook county, for, whenever the state officials have stepped in they want to expend large amounts of money. No doubt it will be economy to construct hard surfaced roads in Tillamook county, and although we are fully aware that there are a large number of our citizens who favor bonding for this purpose, it is, in our judgment, far better to expend a certain amount of the road fund for hard surfacing roads every year, and in a few years this can be accomplished without bonding. As to the amount of roads that should be hard surfaced that should be left to the discretion of the court, for the other roads will have to be maintained and kept up and being better posted on this than the average citizen, the County Court is better able to judge on this matter.

The question of Sunday closing is somewhat difficult to discuss on account of so many conflicting opinions as to how the day should be observed and on that account we do not know that we can throw much light on the subject, other than that held by our citizens. All intelligent and well read individuals admit that Sunday as a day of rest, is a great benefit to the human race. As there appears to be a disposition on the part of some of the citizens to close up stores and moving picture theatre on Sundays, it will become a burning question in the city in the near future, and the citizens will be greatly divided. We find that some of our well meaning citizens are inconsistent when it comes to practicing what they preach. Now if it is wrong and a sin for persons to work or trade on Sundays for gain, it must be equally wrong and a sin to aid that in many ways. For illustration, persons who patronize stores on Sundays, takes a train or hires a rig or auto; employs labor—domestic or otherwise, goes to the postoffice for mail, purchases Sunday newspapers, takes milk or burn electric lights uses the telephone quite frequent, etc. all of which entail Sunday labor, should first put into practice a strict observance of Sunday before they undertake to legislate or dictate what the other fellow should do on that day. So before our well meaning citizens undertake to put the lid on Sunday closing, trading or labor they should first satisfy themselves that they are not morally guilty of violating the Sabbath day in some of the instances we have mentioned. And as we feel we are a sinner in some of these respects, we are not going to take the untenable position of throwing stones while we live in a glass house. We do say this, however, that the Sabbath should be more reverently observed than it is, and too many persons have to labor on that day because of conditions and so many different opinions as to how the day should be observed.

Immediately after Easter, although the time may be a mere coincidence Judge Hugo Grimm indulged in some obiter dicta in a divorce decision in which he upheld the right of a man to criticize the dress of his wife and daughter, not merely on the ground of cost but of looks. It seems that one of the allegations of a complaint filed by a wife was that her husband had told her that her dress and gown made her look like a chorus girl. A decree of divorce was granted complainant but the court explained that it was not on this ground. While neither his immediate obligations nor precedent required that the judge pass on this question, he bravely announced a rule as to the abstract rights of husbands and fathers. He held that a husband had a right to express in emphatic terms his disapproval of the dress of his wife, "provided he does not do so in an offensive manner." He went still further, declaring that "it would be for the good society of husbands in the dress of their wives and daughters and asserted their authority."

**Bible Says the Turk Will Come to His End.**

To the Editor.—The awful scourge that like a mighty avalanche is now devastating the fairest parts of Europe is not the time of trouble of Daniel's prophecy, but it is undoubtedly the prelude to it. Soon the Turk will make his last stand at Jerusalem, the day of salvation will end, the great day of the Lord will begin, the time of trouble such as never was will suddenly break upon the world, the King of glory will appear, and the great conflict so long waged with sin will forever end.

What has the Eastern question or the future of the Turk to do with scripture, and why so much concern about whether Turkey or some other power shall occupy Constantinople? More than twenty-four centuries ago, the Lord revealed to the prophet Daniel events that would take place among earthly powers in connection with the closing scenes of earth's history, as follows:

"And he shall plant the tabernacles of his palace between the seas in the glorious holy mountain; yet he shall come to his end, and none shall help him. And at that time shall Michael stand up, the great Prince which standeth for the children of thy people; and there shall be a time of trouble, such as never was since there was a nation even to that same time: and at that time thy people shall be delivered, every one that shall be found written in the book. And many of them that sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake, come to everlasting life, and some to shame and everlasting contempt. Dan. 11:45; 12:1, 2.

This is the conclusion of a long prophecy that begins with the Medo-Persian kingdom and closes with the establishment of the eternal kingdom and the resurrection.

Soon after the death of Alexander the Great, his generals formed a compact for the government of his empire; but it was soon broken, and out of his conquests four kingdoms arose "toward the four winds of heaven." It was not long after this division had been effected till Cassander had succeeded in conquering all that portion of Alexander's kingdom lying north of Jerusalem, leaving but two of the original four divisions remaining. These are mentioned in the prophecy as "the king of the north" and "the king of the south." Since 1453 A. D. when Constantinople fell into the hands of the Turk, this power has ruled over the territory of "the king of the north."

The prophet declares, "He (the king of the north) shall plant the tabernacles of his palace between the seas in the glorious holy mountain; yet he shall come to his end, and none shall help him." Dan. 11:45. This verse speaks of two events that all the world has looked forward to with great apprehension, and has expected to see accomplished at an early date—the driving of the Turk from Europe, and his coming to his end.

The "glorious holy mountain" is where Jerusalem is located, Zech. 8:3; It is situated between the Mediterranean and the Dead Sea. According to the prophecy, the seat of government of the Turk is to be removed from Constantinople and located at Jerusalem.

During the progress of the Balkan war in 1912, many writers in the daily papers and magazines freely expressed their conviction that the time had come for the Turk to leave Europe. While he was driven by the Balkan allies to the verge of Europe, their hands were stayed by the conference of the European powers in London, and the Turk still holds Constantinople. Scarcely had the present war begun when it was freely predicted that this would end the stay of the Turk in Europe.

Paraphrasing the scripture in the light of simple deductions, we have the following: The Turk shall locate his seat of government at Jerusalem, and shall come to his end, and at that time Christ shall begin his eternal reign. The time of trouble to the nations, such as never was, will follow, and at that time all God's people whose names are found written in the book of life, will be delivered.

The thought that Christ takes his kingdom and begins His reign at the beginning of this time of unparalleled trouble to the nations may seem strange to some, but it will be seen to be in perfect accord with the scripture.

Like the muffled tread of the thief in the night, the day of the Lord is stealing upon us. More suddenly than the present war broke over Europe, and with much more dire results, will the war of the great day of God break over all the world. The only safety in that hour will be found in Jesus.

**OLD LINE vs. MUTUAL FIRE INSURANCE.**

**COAST MUTUALS FAIL.**

Three Oregon Fire Mutuals Go Into A Receivership.

Fire Loss Claimants May Collect Little or Nothing.

From Coast Review for March, 1915. The embarrassed Horticultural Fire Relief Association, a Salem fire mutual whose pitiful 40 percent assessments circular we published in February, has failed.

As usual, the assessed members failed to pay the special assessment, and with many thousands of unpaid fire losses the president of the Horticultural was obliged to petition for a receivership. The mutual has \$123,914 liabilities and nominal assets.

The Pacific Home Mutual, which the Horticultural has been trying to take over, is also to be placed in the hands of a receiver.

The Oregon Merchants Mutual, likewise insolvent is in the hands of a receiver.

It is under stood that the insurance commissioner of Oregon will be appointed receiver for all three mutuals. As he is an experienced fire insurance man (Harvey Wells, ex-special agent) he will easily dispose of the remains of the dear departed.

The moral of the mutual failures is obvious. They were organized because stock company rates were "too high", but they later found it necessary to ask the same rates, and tried to collect them too late.

The consequences are unpaid losses which will never be paid in full and may be compromised at as low as 10 cents on the dollar or forever remain unpaid.

**Notice to Contractors.**

Sealed proposals, addressed to the County Court of Tillamook County, Oregon, and endorsed "Proposals to furnish crushed rock." will be received by the County Court of said county, at its office in the Court House at Tillamook City, Oregon, until the hour of 11 o'clock, a.m., on the 17th day of April, 1915, and at that time and place publicly opened and read.

Such proposals shall be for furnishing to Tillamook County, ten thousand (10,000) cubic yards, of crusher run of crushed rock suitable for road building purposes, and shall be separated into the sizes and quantities obtained by the use of one quarter (1/4) inch screen dust jacket over the first section of a perforated screen having three-quarter (3/4) inch perforations, in the third first section, One and three quarters (1 3/4) inch perforations in the second section, and three (3) inch perforations in the third section, and the crusher set to crush down to three inches.

The quality of such crushed rock shall be of the nature of trap, gneiss or basalt, and shall be of close grain and break with a sharp fracture. Each bidder will be required to submit with his bid, a sample of not less than twenty-five pounds in weight, of the class of rock which he proposes to furnish for competition with other classes of rock, and such samples may be held by the County Court as a standard for comparison with further samples which may be taken from the work in case the proposal be accepted and the bidder be awarded the contract for furnishing said crushed rock material.

The successful bidder, upon being awarded the contract, will be required to enter into a contract and bond satisfactory to the said county court that he will furnish the material at the time and in the quantities to be agreed upon up to ten thousand cubic yards.

The County Court reserves the right to reject any and all bids or to accept any bid which may be deemed best for the county.

Each bidder shall furnish with his bid a certified check for \$50.00 as a guarantee that if awarded the contract, he will enter into contract and furnish a bond as stated hereinbefore.
