

ROAD CONTRACTS LET.

Outside Contractors Under Bid Local Contractors.

The April term of the County Court was held last week with County Judge A. M. Hare and Commissioners F. L. Owens and George R. McKimens present.

Claim of M. J. Gersoni for expenses in re-call election, the same was rejected.

In the matter of the petition of L. Stuvenga for a gateway, R. L. Shreve, C. E. Donaldson and V. Holden were appointed a board of county road viewers.

In the matter of the petition of P. W. Todd and D. Martiny for refund of taxes, the same was rejected.

In the matter of the claim of Wm. Maxwell for indemnity, the same was allowed.

In the matter for bids for the construction of buildings at the County Fair grounds, bids as follows were received: Coates and Sheldon, \$1,635; Winters and Hill, Bales and Erskine, \$1,649.50; Frank Hyde, \$1,635.00. The court rejected all bids, but on re-considering the matter awarded the contract to Frank Hyde.

In the matter of the application of Fred Seomp to put in gate in so called county road on his land, he was permitted to do so.

In the matter of making an appropriation for the Tillamook County Fair, the court appropriated \$1,500.00.

In the matter of the petition of L. P. Gray and others for a county road, upon the report of the Board of Road Viewers with damages of \$30.00 to J. J. Hollett and \$147.00 to R. P. Coulson, the petition was granted and the road ordered opened as a public highway.

In the matter of bids for the construction of the Sandlake road, the following bids were opened: Joe Rutgers, Dick Rutgers and Derk Rutgers, \$8,304.32; C. S. Wells, W. H. Leach, and C. W. Clements, \$8,283.70; John Jenck, \$7,799.08; Jeffrey and Bufton, \$5,116.20. The latter was awarded the contract.

In the matter of bids for the construction of what is known as the Hollett road at Blaine: Connie Dye, \$3,880.00; A. Arstall, \$2,553.87; C. S. Wells, W. H. Leach and C. W. Clements, \$3,857.30; Jeffrey and Bufton, \$2,104.15, the latter was awarded the contract.

In the matter of petitions of the Oregon Timber Co., Portland Timber Co. and Luther K. Haak, for remittance of taxes for the year 1914, in which the Portland Timber Co wanted \$1,564.90 refunded; Luther K. Haak \$236.32 refunded; and the Oregon Logging and Timber Co \$4,782.65 refunded, the court rejected and dismissed these claims.

In the matter of bids of what is known as the Garibaldi-Wheeler road only one bid was received that of the Tillamook Bay Construction Co. for \$3,500.00, which was accepted.

NO STATE AID FOR GRAND RONDE ROAD.

Yamhill County Delegation Goes to Salem in Vain.

Final apportionment of the state highway fund for 1915 was made Tuesday by the state highway commission at Salem when \$237,231 was divided among seven counties of the state. The Rex-Tigardville road was allotted \$7,231.

Regarding the meeting at which members of the county court, Senator Vinton and A. L. Jamson were present, the Statesman says:

"Although the commission was importuned by a delegation from Yamhill county to apportion at least \$30,000 to aid in constructing the proposed road from the Grand Ronde reservation westward to Tillamook county to the coast, they were informed that any help this year from the state would be utterly impossible. Pledges of help to the other counties made last year it was declared must be carried out. The commission, however, advised the Yamhill representatives that some help might be forthcoming next year.

County Judge Dodson, of Yamhill county declared that the building of the road was most important and was desired by all the neighboring counties to Yamhill. He said that \$15,000 had been appropriated by Yamhill and Tillamook Counties for building the road, but the total cost would be anywhere from \$60,000 to \$175,000. W. T. Vinton, senator from Yamhill county, told the commission that the road was greatly needed.

"It is the disposition of the commission to help all the counties," said State Treasurer Kay in replying to the Yamhill county delegation's request, "but as you can see we have only so much money to divide and a large part of it already promised, the commission is simply up against it and cannot aid this year."—News Reporter.

Improvement Land Grants.

Over 3,000,000 acres of oil land in Wyoming have been restored to the government reserve by the decision of the United States Supreme Court. The lands in question had been reserved by President Roosevelt, but were, nevertheless, entered upon. When Mr. Taft became president he expressed doubts of his right to make such reservations, and in consequence Congress in 1909 passed an act giving such authority—not before the Pinchot school of conservationists had made Taftian conservatism a target for their attacks. The Supreme Court now holds that the authority to reserve mineral lands resided in the president even before the act of 1909 and that the entries made in defiance of Roosevelt's order are void. That the authority vested in the president would be abused or arbitrarily exerted is improbable; improvident land grants would be much more likely to occur than unreasonable executive reservations. Of the two dangers, wasteful exploitation and overprudent conservation, the former is doubtless the greater.

The report of the Federal Reserve Board showing the condition and comparative volume of operations of the banks of the Federal Reserve System up to March 19, indicates that this far the new system is being capably managed. Cash reserves, gold reserves, and cash reserves against net liabilities, are all reassuring as to methods of management. And the growth of \$2,000,000 in discounts during the week preceding the issuing of the report is gratifying evidence that the board, and the banks in the system, may be relaxing the unnecessary restrictions upon discounts which Mr. Festus J. Wade of St. Louis recently declared to be retarding the development of the newer sections and the return of business activities.

The statement of Senator Pomerene, member of the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections, that a federal presidential primary law cannot be enacted in time for the election of 1916, since it would require uniform action by all the states, or an amendment to the federal constitution, is surprising not because of its substance, but from the fact that it is made at all. The general expectation had been that the matter would be allowed to sleep undisturbed. When the president featured the necessity for such a law in his annual message to the regular session of Congress, it caused a sensation. The citations of provisions of the constitution made by Senator were unnecessary. There was not a justice of the peace in all the country who did not know that such a law would be nugatory, although many persons felt that if Congress should pass such an act nobody would test its validity.

While the belligerents are engaged in the free and unlimited manufacture of international law, the neutrals might retaliate by devising new rules for interned vessels.
