 TILLAMOOK WOULD DEFEAT JUDICIARY BILL. *
 Referendum May be Invoked on Law Creating Extra Judge for Washington and Tillamook. *
 There is considerable talk, especially in Tillamook county, about invoking the referendum on the bill creating a new judiciary district of Washington and Tillamook counties, as will appear from the following item from the Tillamook Headlight: *
 "Time is fast passing away and a very few weeks remain to circulate petitions to refer the new judiciary district of Washington and Tillamook counties. Here is something that the Grangers should take hold of and defeat, for they know full well that it means more taxation to keep on creating new offices. Let's all get busy and 'swat' the system of making the taxpayers keep and feed so many office holders." *
 The matter is being urged by the Fairview Grange of Tillamook County, and it is needless to say that when the grangers are thoroughly aroused over the useless expenditure of the peoples' money, something is bound to "pop." *
 When interviewed by the Itemizer in reference to his attitude concerning the matter of invoking the referendum on the bill, Judge Harry H. Belt said, that, in his opinion, the bill ought never to become a law, as one judge, by hard work, is able to transact all of the business in the courts of the three counties. He states that, from a selfish standpoint, he perhaps should favor the bill, as it reduces his expense account and the amount of work he is obliged to do, but feels that a circuit judge is well paid and should be willing to devote his entire time to the work. *
 The bill was brought about by the manipulations of a few politicians, who apparently had no regard for a useless expenditure of the taxpayers' hard-earned money.—Polk County Itemizer. *
 For some reason, the committee appointed by the Fairview Grange has allowed matters to drift along, and from present indications nothing will be done to refer this measure to the people. One reason being given is, that this is the only measure to be referred, and it would put the state to an expense of \$20,000 for holding an election. What if it does? It will be a good thing and will show up the methods used to create new offices by certain state senators who engineered the whole thing. Anyway Tillamook County is getting the worst of the deal and will only have two terms of court. *
