Improvements at Brighton.

Mr. Lockhart is an enthusiastic booster for Tillamook County, and while his direct interests are at Brighton he does not hesitate to say a good word for any and every community and its future possibilities. The Brighton Development company has sold a large tract holding in that town to outside parties and the management prides itself of the fact that the sales were made not on misrepresentation what Brighton had to offer the purchaser today, but upon the future development of this entire section.

Obituary Notice.

Edam N. Simmons one of the oldest residents of Tillamook died in this city Monday at the age of 92. Funeral services were held Wednesday, practically every resident of the city paying last respects to the dead. Interment was made in the Bay City cemetery.

Mr. Simmons was born in Fountain County, Indiana on January 24, 1823. When 12 years of age he moved with his parents to Illinois, later to Wisconsin and Iowa. In 1850 he crossed the plains to Oregon by team but two years later returned to Iowa by way of Nicaragua. In 1853 he again crossed the plains by team to Oregon settling in Yamhill county. Here he remained until 1888 when he moved to Tillamook county where made his home until death.

During the years Mr. Simmons made his home in this district he made himself popular with the people, always ready to do a neighbor a good turn. In the address given by Rev. Becker at the funeral services Wednesday, many incidents of the deceased's life were touched upon showing the hardships and what price the pioneers of the west paid for the development of the country.

Mr. Simmons is survived by one brother and three sisters. The brother being J. T. Simmons of Seattle and the sisters are Mrs. M. L. Welch of Ridgefield, Wn., Mrs. H. A. Gullian of Attica, Iowa and Mrs. I. C. Quick of Tillamook. The children to survive are D. A. Simmons of Bay City, A. B. Simmons of Yamhill, Mrs. J. H. Crow of Fresno, California and Mrs. S. E. Olson of Sherwood.

Drowned While Clam Digging

Saturday afternoon Heine and Ferdinand Hechenhein, two brothers who are farming the Lang place, went to the clam beds Saturday afternoon to dig clams and have not been seen since.

The first intimation that something had happened was about 6 o'clock Saturday evening when Captain Bell on the Meta M picked up the oars and a board from a boat near Dean's Point. Nothing was seen of the men or boat.

A searching party immediately went out but no trace of the men or boat was found until the next morning when the boat filled with water was discovered a short distance below where the oars were picked up. No shovel or clams were seen.

It is only a matter of conjecture as to what happened. The most acceptable theory is that the men tried to relieve one another at the oars and, in attempting to pass, the boat capsized. It is not known if either could swim, if so, the long rubber boots they wore proved to be too much of a handicap.

Since Sunday afternoon parties have been dragging the river but had no success.

Ferdinand leaves a widow and two small children. She has no relatives in this country. It is said that she had two brothers in the German army, one was killed and the other is wounded in a hospital. Kind neighbors are rendering her all the assistance possible.

New Deep Sea Fish Industry.

Captain Gilmore of Vancouver B. C. was a business visitor to the city several days of last week conferring with the management of the Wheeler Lumber Company regarding the leasing of the tug Vosburg, to be used by a company which Mr. Gilmore represents, for deep sea fishing. According to Captain Gilmore the newly formed company proposes to make an extensive industry out of the sole fishing in the ocean waters off this county shipping the greater part of their catch to the eastern markets. It is claimed by those who have made a study of the conditions that the fish abound there in sufficient quantities to warrant extensive preparations for the shipment. By the proper refrigeration these fish can be shipped as far east as New York City in perfect condition and can be sold in the markets there at exceptionally low price. Captain Gilmore himself is an old fisherman and has followed the industry for a great number of years on the Pacific coast and he states as personally believing the deep sea fishing industry can be made one of the leading commercial commodities of the county. It is understood that the company made successful arrangements with the Wheeler Lumber Company and that the Vosburg will be put into service in the near future. The fish will be handled from Tillamook Bay considerable Tillamook capital being put into the concern.

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
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
