> The Bend Bulletin calls attention to a law (Section 6317, Lord's Oregon Laws) making mandatory the erection of plainly lettered guide posts at every crossing of public roads in the state. The law further provides that until such signs are properly placed the supervisor can draw no pay from the county treasurer for any services rendered. Such signs must have upon them the distance to the next town or public place on such public highway, with such other information as is necessary. The Bulletin says:

> Under these provisions we believe there probably is not a single road supervisor in Crook County who is entitled to his pay from the County Court. And with our road situation as it is we believe that the court would be doing a real service to the public if it hereafter enforces to the letter this section.

> Crook County officials are not alone in derelication as to the law. Every road traveler can point to places in other counties where such signs are In fact some road supervisors ignore the law entirely, much to the inconvenience and annoyance of travelers. Yet these supervisors have their bills audited and paid regularly by the County Court. Hence these officials are as guilty as supervisors .- Oregon-


