Editorial Snap Shots.

We hope Oregon "Dry" had nothing to do with the dry weather we have been experiencing in Tillamook for several weeks, for grass won't stand for a "dry" campaign.

Of course the Boosters' Band will be on hand next week to welcome the Grangers and discourse music evenings. It is one of the pleasant features of a boosters' band to make the visitors and citizens feel jubilant.

The first copy of the Oregon Voter reached our desk, which is full of interesting reading matter for voters to digest. It is published by C. C. Chapman, a live wire and booster for Oregon. One feature about it is, it is devoid of advertisements, and, naturally, it is not out of place to ask who is furnishing the money to produce the Oregon Voter.

We notice that one county stood suit in regard to paying excessive charges for expediting county books under the Commission's instructions. The court agreed that they were too high and the county saved a large sum of money. The auditing "graft" was soon bowled out, thanks to the newspaper who roasted the system.

The matter of building a city hall is causing some little discussion this week, with a strong backing favoring it. There is this much to be said about it, a saving of about \$5,000 will be made if the building is erected now. But it is well to submit the question to a vote of the people whether they want to bond the city. We hope, if a new city hall is erected, it won't be a makeshift proposition, but a building that will be a credit to the city and embrace accommodations for the library, gymnasium, commercial club etc.

Bro. Trombley cannot deny that it was a Democratic slogan to reduce the price of living. When people in this county failed to procure work and ran up bills at the different stores they realized that Democratic free trade had put them on their uppers. Thanks to a number of store keepers, these unfortunate individuals have managed to pull through the winter, only to find money and work scarcer in Tillamook than for many years. We do not want to be pessimistic but the situation needs to be grappled with, for men are needing work and store keepers are wanting their money for carrying people who otherwise would have had to feed at the county's expense. Those who can give employment to men should do so at once and not wait, for every day's work will be appreciated. It is not out of place to mention here that if the county road work could be started, this, too, would be a great benefit to those who want employment. With a little united effort things could be greatly improved in this county, despite the fact that the Democrat party succeeded in reducing the cost of living by depriving men of work to make a living.

The Oregon State Grange meets in this city next week at the invitation of the Grangers of the county, the Tillamook Commercial Club, the Mayor and City Council and the County Court, and it is up to those organizations to give the visitors a right royal reception and extend to them the glad hand and welcome them to the best dairy section in Oregon. Everybody can help, even in some small way, to make the Oregon State Grange meeting in this city a success. Turn out on Monday and meet the visitors at the depot with the glad hand, assist the ladies of the Tillamook Civic League by placing a bedroom at their disposal, be at the depot on Monday with your auto to take the visitors to the hotels and private homes, also on Thursday morning to give the visitors a trip to the cheese factories in autos. Everybody should be willing to do some-

thing and by all pulling together, we feel that the Oregon State Grange meeting in Tillamook City is going to be just as big a success as the G. A. R. encampment was last year and other functions held in this city. The slogan for next week is to wear a broads mile and give the glad hand to the visitors, and everybody do their part, no matter how small to give the Grangers a good time while in Tillamook.

We think it is ill-advised to circulate petitions for the recall of County Assessor C. A. Johnson, for it does not go into the root of the matter. The whole matter is in the county cruise and the side notes in red ink that the cruise of certain timber lands should be raised 50 per cent. Our contention is that the timber in question should be recruited, for it would be unjust to the timber owners to increase the amount of timber 50 per cent if that amount is not on the land, while, on the other hand, it should be assessed if the timber is there. We think every fair minded person will agree with us in this particular. Ever since the timber was cruised the question of adding 50 per cent to certain timber lands have been a perplexing question with the county officials, for it is a question, should the county make the increase, whether they would be sustained if it was contested in the courts. Because the Board of Equalization and the County Assessor did not agree on this matter, we fail to see why the latter should be made the "goat" Lets settle this matter without personalities or strife and like sensible individuals, which can be easily accomplished by recruising timber where there is any question or doubt as to the amount. It is contended, however, that the budget did not appropriate any money for this purpose, but we are inclined to think that if the County Assessor employed cruisers to re-cruise the timber referred to the County Court would have to foot the bill. For instance, C. H. Wheeler has made affidavit that on certain claims the timber has been over-estimated and, consequently his taxes are too high. The proper method, to our way of thinking, would be for the County Assessor to have the timber re-cruised, which would be fair to Mr. Wheeler and the county as well.

The snap shot man avoided all personalities in discussing the new judicial district bill, placing the blame where it belonged—to a frame-up of Washington County politicians, who railroaded the bill through the state Legislature, for when the bill was defeated in the Senate by one vote, the last day of the session, it was resurrected by one Senator being induced to change his mind and vote, and the bill became a law. As a newspaper we think we did our duty to the people in opposing it, for there was no need of a change as far as Tillamook County was concerned. Judge Belt was opposed to it and stated that he could handle the work and the attorneys of this city were well pleased with Judge Belt and were not desirous of a change in the judicial district, and the people of this county had elected Judge Belt by a flattering majority of votes) did not want the change and additional taxation. But since Bro. Trombley has indulged in personalities and accused the snap shot man of things that are false, we have a right to "come back" and give the political flip-flopper a few digs in the ribs. He has brought the old chestnut, the Warren Construction Co., into the controversy, but what has that to do with Washington County politicians railroaded a bill through the State Legislature heaven only knows, but it shows the stupidity of Bro. Trombley dragging this into the matter. But we want our readers to carefully consider this little bit of tommy rot in the article published by our esteemed contemporary:

"Mr. Baker has no regard for our already overburdened, tax ridden farmers, who are dead set against useless elections and other useless expense accounts, but, just to satisfy a personal spite, he would do everything in his power to bring on a special election in an endeavor to oust Judge Bagley."

My! My! My! Gee Wiz! What about "our already overburdened tax ridden farmers" who have to pay additional taxes in this successful effort to create a new office that the people of Tillamook County did not need nor want? Such logic is enough to make a Coon laugh. As we remarked before we had refrained from personalities, but having to defend ourselves by base and false insinuations being thrown at us, we will throw a little more light on the subject for the information of the people and the "overburdened, tax ridden farmers." It was generally understood here on the Saturday before the State Legislature adjourned, that the bill had been defeated, but being resurrected and passed as we have stated above, only a few persons in Tillamook

knew what was going on and did not know that it had become a law. But it seems that a few persons including F. R. and A. G. Beals, who were informed, prepared a petition and a few persons signed it, which was sent or wired to Governor Withycombe as Tillamook County's endorsement of the bill. We have no quarrel with the Beals' on that score, other than the petition did not express the sentiment of the people of Tillamook County, but simply their own. We will ask Bro. Trombley how many "overburdened, tax ridden farmers" were asked to sign this petition to place more taxation on themselves? The petition did not express the sentiment of the farmers, the local attorneys nor the people of the county. We have all seen a poor little dog with a tin can tied to his tail by some mischievous boys, and Bro. Trombley is acting in the capacity of the little dog and the tin can, espousing the cause of the politicians and those who concocted and arranged the frame up to create another judicial district, and defeat the sovereign will of the people. We can vouch for three persons in this county who wanted the district changed—F. R. Beals, A. G. Beals, and C. E. Trombley.

NEW JUDICIAL DISTRICT.

Takes Vote of entire State to Refer It to the People.

Attorney John R. Callahan has received an answer to his inquiry whether it takes the vote of the entire state or the judicial districts affected to refer the new judiciary law to a vote of the people. Secretary Ben W. Olcott has replied that it must be referred to the state and will require 13,211 signatures to the petitions. The new law, however, gives Tillamook County three terms of court, viz, the first Mondays in February, May and October, but this year owing to the other law specifying June as one of the months in which a term of the circuit court was to be held, will be superseded by the new law.

We give below the new law, which goes into effect the 22nd of May.

CHAPTER 333.
AN ACT.

To create the nineteenth Judicial District of the State of Oregon, and to provide for Circuit Judge and the terms of the court in said district.

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Oregon:

- Section 1. That there shall be and is hereby created a judicial district of the State of Oregon composed of the county of Washington and the county of Tillamook, and for that purpose the county of Washington is detached from the Fifth Judicial District and the County of Tillamook is detached from the Twelfth Judicial District of the State of Oregon.
- Section 2. The terms of the Circuit Court of the Nineteenth Judicial District shall be held annually in the County of Washington on the first Monday in March, the first Monday in July, and the first Monday in November, of each year; in the county of Tillamook on the first Monday in February, first Monday in May, the first Monday in October of each year.
- Section 3. Immediately after the taking effect of this Act the Governor shall appoint a suitable and qualified person, a resident of the Nineteenth Judicial District, to serve as Judge of the Circuit Court for the Nineteenth Judicial District and until the next general election and his successor is elected and qualified; and there shall be elected at the next general election in the year 1916 to be held in the State of Oregon, and every six years thereafter, a Circuit Judge of said district who shall hold office until his Circuit Judges of the state, to be paid monthly by the state as other Circuit Court Judges may be paid.
- Section 4. The Judge of the Nineteenth Judicial District shall receive the same salary as is paid to the other Circuit Judges may be paid.
- Section 5. The duties and jurisdiction of said Nineteenth Judicial District and the Judges thereof shall be such as are provided by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Oregon.
