TO-DAY'S SESSION OF THE OREGON STATE GRANGE

Will Meet Next Year at Grants Pass—More Resolutions Adopted.
 This (Thursday) morning the delegates and visitors were taken by auto mobile to the cheese factories and a fifteen mile ride through the valley.
 The committee on Legislation reported favorably on the resolution permitting the people of each county the privilege of regulating salaries in their respective counties. The resolution was adopted.
 The report of the Executive Committee showing that \$1,596.63 had been expended for extension work, and recommended that the dues in the order be increased, so as to permit further extension work in organizing local granges, and that the publication of the Oregon Grange Bulletin be continued, was read and adopted.
 Upon the second ballot it was voted to hold the next session of the Grange at Grant's Pass.
 The report of the Committee on Legislation which favored the abolishment of all game and fish wardens and permitting the duties of these wardens to be performed by county sheriffs and road supervisors was adopted.
 The portions of State Master Spence's address relating to farm credits and national woman suffrage was indorsed and adopted.
 The Committee on Resolutions offered a resolution thanking the Granges of Tillamook County, The Women's Civic League and the Tillamook Commercial Club a vote of thanks for their hospitality which was unanimously adopted.
 The Committee on education reported indorsing the Smith-Lever bill which permits the employment by counties of agriculturalists and the extension of home economics. After a long discussion this report was unanimously adopted.
 Memorial services were then held for the departed brothers and sisters who have been voting members of the State Grange.
 This (Thursday) evening a class of 125 will be initiated into the mysteries of the fifth and sixth degrees.

Death of Eustias Petteys.
 On Friday at 5:30 P. M., of last week Eustias Marion Petteys, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mandel B. Petteys, of Bay City, died at the home of his uncle J. C. Bewley, of this city. Deceased had been ailing with diabetes for some time and was at the Bewley home for the purpose of taking treatments. He was 18 years old, a fine young man much beloved by all who knew him. He was an active and much valued member of the band, playing the baritone.
 The funeral services were held at the home at Bay City on Sunday, and interment took place at the Bay View cemetery. Rev. Shrode preached the funeral sermon.
 Deceased leaves a father, mother, two brothers and one sister, and many other relatives and friends who are much grieved at his untimely death.

Death of Frank Foster.
 The sad intelligence of the death of Frank Foster reached here this week. Mr. Foster was taken ill about a year ago and gave up his work, although a year previous to this he had not been in good health. The doctors diagnosed his case as tubercular trouble and then a fight began to dislodge the tubercular germs. Until his death everything known to medical science and changes of climate were tried.
 In February, 1914, he went to Goodings, Idaho, where he remained until summer when he returned to Cloverdale feeling somewhat improved. August 29, he and his father left for Portland where they remained for some time while Frank was under treatment from specialists. Later it was thought best to change climate and they went to Idaho and from Idaho to Tilla Roso, New Mexico, where he died on April 27, 1915; the immediate cause of his death being a complication of stomach and heart affection. Interment was had at the above place.
 Frank Foster was born in central California November 23, 1884, was married to Miss Mabel Kimble at Tillamook September 23, 1909. Besides his parents and a brother and sister he leaves a widow and three small children to mourn their loss. His father was his constant companion during the long period of illness.
 The bereaved relatives have the heartfelt sympathy of a host of his friends in this sad affliction.—Cloverdale Courier.
