Because of the change in the state

constitution requiring that all voters must be citizens of the United States, as well as of the State of Oregon, there will probably be a rush of naturalization during the next few months on the part of persons of foreign birth who have heretofore been voting on their "first papers."

Prior to 1906 it made no difference how long a person waited, after declaring his intention of becoming a citizen, before he applied for his final papers: On September 6th of that year, however, a federal statute went into effect requiring an applicant for naturalization to complete the procedure within seven years from the date of filing his declaration of intention. A ruling of the department of Commerce and Labor, bearing upon the subject, holds that this law is not retrospective, and consequently does not affect those whose declarations were filed prior to the date the law became effective. Therefore, this law, at the present time bars only those of alien birth who secured their "first papers" between September 6, 1906, and May, 1908.
