**Editorial Snap Shots.**

All laws that were passed at the last State Legislature, with the exception of those vetoed by the Governor, went into effect on Saturday.

We believe in being most liberal in supplying water to the citizens and making the rates as low as possible, for plenty of clean water is death to infectious germs.

Italy has decided to participate in the European war. That is not surprising, for there appears to be an impression that if the Kaiser's militarism prevails in the present deplorable war, Germany will dominate and hold the "big stick" over all the European countries.

It is reported that taxes in Oregon last year, including Government, State and City taxes, amounted to \$36,328,000, which is \$45.41 per capita. Well, it takes money to make the mare go, and as there are a large amount of improvement going on, this can be obtained only with money.


Next Thursday a vote will be taken at a special election to determine whether Tillamook is to have a new city hall. The old city hall is a disgrace to a live, wide-awake city, and as there appears to be a strong sentiment in favor of a new building, for the reason that it is intended to have a building that can be used for other purposes than strictly municipal affairs. A large auditorium, public library and reading rooms, gymnasium, etc., will be valuable additions to the city.

This is worth repeating, on account of the great increase in the valuation of land in Tillamook County in recent years. The Oregonian says:

"If the sale of farm land in Marion County at \$73 an acre in a region where price has ranged around \$200 means that the selling values have fallen, the reduction is not an evil. Land at that figure can be made to pay profits and be a live asset, while the newcomer looks upon the higher priced acreage is more or less of a liability."

Surely it is time that the old, dirty looking, unsanitary, city hall was dumped onto the rubbish heap and destroyed, and a new up-to-date building constructed to take its place. We know that the Women's Civic League will coincide with us in this instance, as will every progressive business man in the city. Now is your time to get a city hall, but it will take votes to obtain it. The persons who stay at home and take no interest in city affairs should arouse themselves in behalf of this necessary public improvement and cast their votes for it.

**Democracy a Boon to Canada.**  
British Columbia lumbermen are preparing to enter the Atlantic coast market of the United States on a large scale. One firm will cut between 100,000,000 and 200,000,000 feet a year on Vancouver Island for shipment to New York, United States Council Newcomb, of Victoria, says "the shingle industry is very brisk" and some lumbermen are moving "to secure tonnage for export of lumber to France and Belgium, where a great demand is expected when the war is over. A large mill which has been closed for nearly a year has resumed operations, though "excessive transportation rates effectually prevent any export business."

Canada is thus preparing to occupy the Eastern market, which naturally belongs to the United States. When peace is restored, Canada will have the benefit of abundant British vessels at rates lower than American ship-owners can make. American lumbermen will be precluded by our laws from using this cheap tonnage to carry lumber through the Panama Canal to Atlantic Coast; they will be limited to the high priced American ships. This disadvantage in competition will be offset neither by a protective tariff, the Democratic party having put lumber on the free list, nor by exemption from canal tolls, the Democratic party aided by a few Republicans who look at American questions through foreign spectacles, having repealed the exemption clause.

If the lumber industry of the Pacific Coast, the greatest industry in Oregon, is to thrive, it must do so in spite of the action of the United States Government.—Oregonian.

William Elliott, formerly from Michigan, but now of Alberta, Canada, is visiting Frank Long, who have not seen one another for 24 years. It is 25 years since Mr. Elliott proved up on a preemption claim on Wilson river.

To test for tuberculosis a large percentage of the milk cows now furnishing milk to cities, State Veterinarian Lytle, in co-operation with the State Dairy and Food Commissioner, will put a man in the field in a few days. The Dairy and Food Commissioner already has a man who is making tests. He has visited Salem, Albany and Eugene and has been asked to examine 539 cows. The work will be followed by an educational campaign in which movies will play an important part.

**An Influence for Peace.**

This country has about 2,600,000 inhabitants of German birth. There are, in addition 5,600,000 of German descent, making a total of a little more than 8,000,000 inhabitants of German blood, 8 per cent of the total population. No considerable of our people are desirous of war with Germany, but it is safe to assume that the strongest hope that war will be averted is felt by Americans of German nativity or descent. That hope is but natural and is not to be condemned, if it is not expressed in active opposition to the course of the government. There is no doubt, however, of the essential loyalty of this element of our population. The Americans of German blood would fight Germany, if the country called them to the colors, with strength and fidelity, although it would be, perhaps, with full hearts.

But the German Government should not be permitted to labor under any delusion as to the ultimate attitude of Germans in America as to this matter. The conviction that our Germans will stand by our government whatever ensues, should be a strong influence for peace in the minds of the Kaiser and his council, and the action of the 8000+ German-Americans of Baltimore, on Sunday, is an example that might well be followed elsewhere. "While proud of our German ancestry," they said in resolutions addressed to President Wilson, "we know only one flag—the flag of our country; and we tender to you, the standard-bearer, our individual loyalty." Let the imperial government understand that German-Americans are American Germans. That government cannot help but feel the racial pressure of such a stand by 8,000,000 of its race. Nor, sentiment aside, is it blind to the moral and commercial value of the continued friendship and sympathy of so large an element of the American population.

**Grief and Joy.**

There is no perfect happiness in this world. No one lives but has his share of the sorrow to bear. Sympathy of friends may alleviate but cannot lift the burden from the shoulders. Some sorrows are of your own making. Some are caused by others, those who have been dear to you, whom you have loved or for whom you are responsible. Some, like the death of one near and dear to you, are in accordance with the laws of God. Grief that is unavoidable should be born with courage.

When you find yourself unhappy, stop to think what makes you so. Is it some fault of your own? If so, think whether there is not something you can do to make matters better. If the fault is another's, still see if you cannot make it right. When nothing can be done, do not sit and nurse your grief. That only makes it heavier. Rather try to get your mind on something else. There are sources of happiness to which you can turn if you seek them. A good way to lesson your sorrow is to seek out those whose sorrow is greater than your own. Just as happiness that is shared is doubled, grief shared is divided.

Nothing can make you happy if you do not cultivate the proper disposition. Then cultivate that. Do not allow trifling matters to disturb you. Seek happiness by giving happiness. Rejoice in all the good in others in all noble deeds done, in all that helps the world to grow better. Mourn sorrow is selfishness. Put selfishness out of your own heart, and you will find happiness looming up much larger than sorrow.
