

**BAY CITY MILL LEASED.**

Oregon Box Company to use Old Curtis Plant.

After negotiations of several months an agreement has been made by the Bay City Land Company and the Oregon Box and Manufacture Co. by which the old Curtis Mill in Bay City will be leased by the latter company and used until a new factory is erected for cutting lumber which will be shipped to the Portland plant, except slunks in carload lots for the Southern states, which will be handled direct from Bay City.

Under the terms of the lease the Oregon Box & Manufacturing Company guarantees to cut at least 6,000,000 feet of lumber a year, though it is expected about 30,000 feet a day will be turned out. The lease runs for two years, at which time, if business conditions have returned to the normal, the company will erect a large and modern plant on a site which has been donated for that purpose.

According to O. H. Schwerdtmann, secretary-treasurer and manager of the Oregon Box Company, 27 men will be employed in the mill and yards here, while an equal number will be hired by Fred Burton, who will supply the mill with logs.

**Fire Destroys A. Klein's House.**

Fire Thursday night at Nehalem, destroyed the home of Andrew Klein while the family was absent. The loss was about \$5000 and insurance of \$3000 was carried. The origin has not been determined.

The house was situated outside the city limits and the fire department was unable to reach it.

**Wheeler Cannery Sends Two Cars for Trans-Atlantic Shipment.**

The Union Fisheries Co-operative Canning Company of Wheeler is shipping two carloads of 1914 milder pack to New York for trans-Atlantic passage from there. The exact destination has not been made public but it is known that the purchase was made through a Danish firm.

The net weight of the shipment is about 64,000 pounds, the price being rumored at 10 cents. The cars are being refrigerated here from the cannery's new ice plant. More shipments are said to be pending and there is every prospect of a good pact for 1915.
