

Due Tribute Paid Nation's Heroes.

On Monday the members of the Corinth post, Grand Army of Republic, marched in company with the members of the Women's Relief Corps and school children, to the Christian Church where the memorial exercises were held. The procession was led by the drum corps.

At the church which was decorated with flags and banners and flowers, a large crowd had assembled.

The opening service was given according to the G. A. R. ritual, and the drum corps gave a selection, J. H. Johnson read Lincoln's Gettysburg address, admirably. A recitation by Rowena Hanson, was well spoken as was the one given by Nevelle Smith. The violin solo by Chester McGhee was very pleasing. The recitation spoken by Mrs. Lucas reminded us all of what we shall have to do after the last of the G. A. R. veterans have answered the roll call yonder. The dialogue by Kenneth Rugar and Billy Stillwell was heartily applauded. Rev. Gittins delivered the sermon and in his address paid due tribute to the dead soldiers. The Star Spangled Banner, was sung by Mrs. Page, with much spirit and impressiveness, the recitation by Commander Reynolds was well rendered, also the memorial exercise by the first grade children, Nevelle Smith, Mary Joliffe, Marion Lamb and Gerald Crenshaw. The quartet by Mrs. Trombley, Mr. Goyne Mr. and Mrs. Edmunds was exquisite in harmony and particularly affecting the lines, "Cover them over with beautiful flowers," the piano duet by Miss Wolfe and Miss Riggs and the solo by Mrs. Williams enjoyed by every one the recitation, spoken by J. H. Johnson aroused the audience to the significance of memorial day. While the audience sang America, Rowena Hanson and Kenneth Rugar appeared in a tableau, "We are for World Peace" which had especial significance to many in the audience, whose thoughts were directed to the war in Europe. After the program was concluded at the church, the members of the W. R. C. conducted the ceremony, according to the ritual, of casting flowers upon the water of Hoquarton slough, in memory of sailors lost at sea during the Civil war.

In the County Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Tillamook. Notice is hereby given that hearing on the following petition will be held at the Court House, in the City of Tillamook, County of Tillamook, State of Oregon, on the 16th day of July, 1915, for the purpose of determining whether the prayer of the said petition shall be granted.

All persons owning or claiming an interest in lands described in said petition are hereby notified to appear at said place and on said date and at said place and on said date and prayer in said petition should not be granted.

To the Honorable County Court of Tillamook County, State of Oregon: The undersigned being the owners of more than fifty per cent of the acreage of the contiguous body of swamp, wet and overflow land in Tillamook County, Oregon, hereinafter described, do hereby petition your Honorable Body to cause to be organized a drainage district for the purpose of having such land re-claimed and protected from the effects of water for sanitary and agricultural purposes, and for the convenience and welfare of the public, and for the public utility and benefit, and for the purpose of this petition we state the following matters as required by Chapter 340 of the General Laws of Oregon, for the year 1915:

I. The name proposed for such district is "Tillamook Drainage District"

II. The boundary lines of the proposed district are as follows:

Beginning at a point 20 feet East of the West line of Section 31, in Township 1 South, of Range 9 West, W. M., and 30 rods South of the Northwest corner of said Section, and running thence East to the West line of the James and Anna Quick Donation Land Claim in Section 32, said Township and Range; thence South to the South line of the Northwest quarter of the Southeast quarter of said Section 32; thence West to the Southwest corner of the Northeast quarter of the Southwest quarter of said Section 32; thence South to the South line of said Section 32; thence West to the Southwest corner of said Section 32; thence North to the Southeast corner of the Northwest quarter of the Southeast quarter of Section 31, in said Township and Range; thence West to the Southwest corner of the Northwest quarter of said Section 31; thence North 1954.2 feet to the North line of tract owned by Ben Jacob; thence West to the East line of the County Road on the East side of Trask River; thence following the East line of said county road in a Northwesterly direction to a point within 20 feet of the West side of said Section 31; thence North to the place of beginning.

Such lands constitute a contiguous body of swamp, wet and overflow lands.

III. The total acreage included in the said proposed district is 555 acres.

IV. The names of the owners of the land in said proposed district, as shown by the records of Tillamook County, Oregon, and the acreage owned by each of said owners is as follows:

V. The proposed reclamation and protection of said lands is for sanitary and agriculture purposes, and such proposed reclamation and protection will be conducive to the public health and welfare, and of public utility and benefit.

VI. All of the lands included in said proposed district are properly included therein, and will be beneficially affected by the operations of the proposed district.

VII. The benefits of such proposed reclamation and protection will exceed the damage to be done and the best interests of the land included, and of the owners of such land as a whole, and of the public at large will be promoted by the formation and proposed operations of said district.

VIII. The formation of a drainage district under the provisions of Chapter 340 of the General Laws of Oregon for 1915, under the provisions of which this petition is proposed, is a proper and advantageous method of accomplishing the reclamation and protection of the lands included in said proposed drainage district.

IX. The proposed plan for the reclamation and protection of the property in the proposed drainage district is, that a ditch shall be put in running from the West side of the proposed district (connecting with a ditch running along the West side of the district which empties into the Trask River), easterly along the foot of the hill which is along the North side of the district, following the line of the ditch already partially constructed in that locality to the East side of the district. Also there is to be constructed another ditch connecting with the ditch above mentioned running South on the west line of the East half of the Northeast quarter of Section 31, in Township 1 South, Range 9 West

to the quarter section line running East and West through said Section, and running thence East along the quarter section line to the East line of the proposed district, or so far as may be found necessary for the drainage purposes in question. The two ditches are to be the main ditches for the drainage proposed, and they are to be constructed with such laterals as may be found necessary to make the drainage effectual. The land included in the proposed district is so situated that without ditches being constructed the water is not drained off and the land remains cold and sour. There is a fall of about 25 feet from the East side of the district to the West side thereof, and it is believed that with the construction of the ditch as proposed the water will be drained off from all of the lands so that they will dry much more rapidly, and the same will be in proper condition for cultivation, and much more productive.

X. The signers of this petition agree that they will pay any and all expenses incurred, and any tax or taxes that may be levied against their respective lands for the purpose of paying the expense of organizing or attempting to organize the proposed district, such expense to be taxed against the lands of the signers in proportion to the number of acres owned by them and affected by the proposed drainage.

XI. Wherefore, your petitioners pray that the lands described herein, or such of them as may be found by the court to be properly included in the proposed drainage district either permanently or until further investigation and surveys may permit elimination, shall be declared organized into a drainage district under the provisions of Chapter 340 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1915.

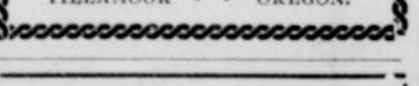
