The significance of the incident is increased by surrounding facts and circumstances. The Germans are invaders, holding possession of that part of France in which Noyers is situated. German soldiers were the only ones participating in the cere-monies, and it was their commander, Gen. von Einem, surrounded by a brilliant staff and many detachments of the German troops engaged in the battle of the Meuse, who, speaking in French, intrusted the monument, inscribed, in both French and German, "For the Fatherland," to the care of the French residents, who will hold the ground after the war is ended. The French president of the district, replying, expressed his appreciation of German recognition of the valor of France's victorious battalions, and that foeman dying for their country were worthy of a foeman's honor.

There might really be a larger hope of the ending of wars did they not sometimes afford brave men the opportunity of doing such fine things as the one the Germans have just done at Noyers.
