Mr. Dunstan has been quite sick at times lately, and not getting better thought it advisable to undergo an operation. He informs us that the new building at the fair grounds will be completed this week and that the school districts will take part in the fair. Every thing is in good shape and a good fair is predicted. Mr. Dunstan expects to be away several weeks, and any information in regard to the fair can be obtained from the secretary, Wm. G. Tait, or L. M. Kraner. *
 District Attorney Goyne went to Cloverdale last week to investigate some trouble two men by the names of Dugan and Paul got into. It is alleged they went down the Nestucca in a motor boat and a row between them took place. Paul had Dugan arrested charged with assault. As the men had been drinking Mr. Goyne did not think the evidence sufficient to warrant a conviction. Dugan it is said had a sum of money on him which he claims was stolen, and it was on account of this that the trouble originated. Dugan it seems got into other trouble by cutting the tire of the auto of the Cloverdale butcher, which he settled for. The case was dismissed. *
 At a meeting of the city council on Monday evening bids were opened for the construction of a steel draw bridge across Hoquorton Slough. There were only two bids, that of the Feeney Bremer Co. and the Portland Bridge and Iron Co., and A. T. Dolan had a bid in for the concrete work. The bid of the former was \$6,650 for the bridge complete with side walk and that of the latter was \$6,884.00, with extras amounted to \$7,034.00. The contract was let to Feeney Bremer Co. The only other business before the city council was the passage of an ordinance closing bowling alleys on Sundays, repealing an ordinance increasing automobiles and allowing H. T. Botts \$500.00 for attorney's fees. *

amongst the litigants, and the personalities indulged in at the meeting at the court house have already caused some bad blood, especially those by A. G. Beals who indulged in insulting language against several of the leading business men of the city. It is within the province of the litigants to settle with the construction company if they feel disposed, but it is up to the City Council, who employed competent attorneys to look after the city's and the citizens' interest to see that they all get a square deal.

Construction Company Wants to Compromise.

The Warren Construction Co made a proposition to the citizens who brought suit against that company for not complying with the specifications in laying the pavement in the city, in which the company agrees to reduce the cost of the pavement 20c. per yard, give a ten year guarantee, and waive all interest, which amounts to \$32,000, also to pay the litigants \$25,000.

The litigants have held two meetings to consider the matter and a committee was appointed to submit another proposal to the construction company. There appears to be some criticism in regard to the litigants accepting the \$25,000 to drop the case as that appears to be in the nature of a bribe, especially when it was freely stated when the case was started that if the litigants won out the construction company would not be able to collect anything for the pavement. There appears to be some friction
