CHAUTAUQUA A SUCCESS.

Large Crowds Attend and Citizens Delighted with the Entertainments.

The first Chautauqua held in Tillamook County is now in progress in this city, with considerable interest and large and delighted audiences participating in the different features. It is the Ellison-White Chautauqua System, that commenced a week's engagement here on Monday, made possible by some of the leading citizens who put up a guarantee.

The Chautauqua was somewhat late in getting started on Monday afternoon, as those who had to take part in the program did not reach the city until the passenger train came in from Portland that afternoon. There was a good attendance when D. L. Shrode welcomed the first Chautauqua to Tillamook, and it afforded him great pleasure in doing so. Superintendent Earle E. Miller, briefly responded and announced the different features that would compose the programs for each day, after which he introduced the Adelpian Male Quartet, composed of H. C. and R. H. House and C. H. and C. L. Aller. They delighted the audience with their melodies and songs.

The evening program consisted of numerous selections by the Adelpian Male Quartet who again delighted the audience which was much larger than the afternoon gathering. This was followed by a lecture by Colonel William Hamilton Miller, whose subject was "Our Neighboring Town." His lecture was brim full of wit and humor and good horse sense, and the stories he told not only afforded a larger amount of laughter but appropriately illustrated the points of his lecture.

Tuesday afternoon and evening the Adelpian Male Quartet gave the preludes, and on both occasions they again delighted the audience and received general applause. Colonel Miller's lecture was "Farming and Being Farmed" the audience being much larger in the afternoon than the previous evening.

Mrs. Marion Ballou Fisk made her first appearance that evening. She is a cartoonist and made a good impression, not only in sketching and characterizing persons she had met, but was highly entertaining with her talks while doing so.

The attractions at the Chautauqua brought together two of the largest crowds on Wednesday. The features were, in the afternoon, Mrs. M. B. Kisk, cartoonist; and Witepskie's Royal Hungarian Orchestra; and in the evening the orchestra, with Miss Bergh as vocal soloist. The orchestra and Miss Bergh pleased the large audience, and they were largely applauded. Arthur A. Franzke followed by a lecture "The spirit of the Rockies." It was simply a political speech attacking representative government and lauding the initiative and referendum.

Had Narrow Escape.

Merril Smith, the rural mail carrier came near plunging into Hoquarton slough with his auto on Tuesday morning. A "Chestnut" Lecture.

Arthur A. Franzke's lecture at the Chautauqua was disappointing, exceedingly so. More than 20 years ago we heard political speakers talk along the same lines in Oregon, so instead of presenting something new, his subject was a chestnut as far as this state is concerned. Notwithstanding that the people of the United States claim that the country have the best laws of any country, Mr. Franzke endeavored to prove that representative form of government was a failure and a fizzle by pointing out some of the

defects and purposely avoided saying one word where it had proved a success and made the United States the most progressive country in the whole world. True, legislatures and legislators have been corrupt and there is need of improvement. No one will deny this. One flagrant remark made by Mr. Franzke, which is a common expression and may have been used without serious consideration, and that was "everybody had their price." So, according to his own logic, no matter what system of government is adopted there will always be those who have their price. Mr. Franzke should investigate and point out some of the defects and absurdities of the initiative and referendum and how class legislation can be worked through. But, no, he saw only the defects in the representative form of government, and is one of those who look upon the Oregon system as a Simon pure method of government.
