Court Awards Contract for Hardsurfacing County Roads.

Court convened on July 7th, 1915. A. M. Hare, judge; Geo. R. McKimmens and F. L. Owens, commissioners, and J. C. Holden, present.

Dr. R. T. Boals was appointed as county health officer.

It is ordered that the claim of the Bay City Examiner for \$2.40 be continued.

The claim of M. Chelich for \$38.20 was continued.

The claim of the Tillamook Headlight for printing notices for \$38.00 was continued.

The claim of the Tillamook Hotel of \$8.00 for board was continued.

In the matter of the petition of F. L. Buell and others for vacation of county road, same was granted.

In the matter of the claim of Frank Paul for injuries received in auto accident, same is rejected.

In the matter of claim of John Theiler for costs in Supreme Court case. Said claim of \$64.00 is ordered paid.

Claim of W. E. Noyes for \$12.50 for loss of cow, under the statute, same was allowed.

In the matter of Ike Quick and others for county road the same was rejected.

In the matter of bids for the construction of a portion of the Geo. R. McKimmens road, the following bids were received: Tillamook Bay Construction Co., \$132.50; W. D. Wood, embankment, \$2,616.40; W. D. Wood, trestle, 2,629.03. The bid of W. D. Wood for embankment was accepted.
