Small received word from Boston and New York that the Eastern fish market is demoralized as the following item will prove: "Eastern salmon from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia have been very cheap lately, selling around ten cents. Some mixed cars of steelheads and halibut here this week and steelheads sold for 3 cents. We are getting salmon and halibut from Seattle every week in carload lots."

Mrs. A. Imhah, mother of Alex Imhah, of Cloverdale, died last week at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Harrison Jones, at Gervais, Oregon, and the remains were buried on Monday at Fairfield. Mrs. Imhah is survived by two other daughters, Mrs. Belle DuRette, of Fairfield, and Mrs. Louisa Miller, of Salem, and four sons James Imhah, of Salem; Alex Imhah, of Cloverdale; David Imhah, of Lostine and John Imhah, of Fairfield.

Plans and specifications have been drawn for the construction of a seawall that will extend along the ocean side of the Bayocean peninsula from the caves to the sand spit on the north. This bulkhead is to be built of reinforced concrete and will be provided with a six foot promenade on top. Cluster lights will be installed at 50-foot intervals. The whole work may not be completed this year, but actual construction on a 350-foot section has already commenced.

For concrete hard surface roads in Tillamook County bids under consideration range from \$1.25 to \$1.35 a square yard. Prices run considerably higher than the corresponding grade of concrete upon which bids were received in Multnomah County. Part of the difference in cost is due to the distance which paving plant would have to be removed, and part would be the circumstance that a first-class grade of rock has not been found at available quarries in Tillamook County. Rock may have to be hauled by rail or boat from the Columbia River, which is costly.—Oregon Voter.

Arenze Construction Company, of Salem, who have the contract for hardsurfacing three pieces of county road, commenced work on Monday on the Hunt's bridge road. Some little commotion was caused on Tuesday when the company posted notices that they would close the road, which would have greatly interfered with travel and the dairymen who take their milk to the Tillamook Creamery.

William F. McCombs, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, last week received from Dallas, Tex., an offer of \$100,000 as a cash contribution to the National Democratic Committee should the 1916 convention be held in that city. Dallas also pledged a coliseum seating 25,000 persons and adequate hotel accommodations.
