### ANOTHER LOCAL CONTRACTOR SUCCESSFUL.

Tillamook Bay Construction Co. to Build Sour Grass Road.

At a joint session of the County Courts of Yamhill and Tillamook Counties at McMinnville on Saturday, five bids were submitted for grading the new road between the two counties, or what is known as the Sour Grass route, and the contract was let to the Tillamook Bay Construction Co., who had the lowest bid which was \$18,862.56. This does not include culverts or bridges, but for grubbing and grading the 5 1/2 miles of road. There was a difference of over one thousand dollars in the next lowest bid. It will require another appropriation by both counties to surface the road next year, and it is hoped this will be completed for next year's summer travel.

Long & Trent, of McMinnville 25,338.80  
J. H. Hicks, Tillamook Bay Construction Co, Bay City 18,862.56  
Carlton Timber & Cons. Co. of Carlton 20,539.14

Mr. Hicks informs us that two loads of equipment left on Wednesday and two more loads left this (Thursday) morning. The work will be pushed as rapidly as possible, but cannot be used this year, for no provision is made for several small bridges that will have to be built.

An effort was made by one of the contractors to have the courts delay for two weeks awarding the contract, but Commissioners Allen, of Yamhill, and Owens, of Tillamook, would not stand for that, Mr. Allen contending that it was unfair to do so now that they had received the bids.

### WOOD LAW TO BE INFORCED

Deputy Sealer Issues Orders as to Delivery of Fuel.

Salem, Or., July 27.—Deputy State Sealer of Weights and Measures Buchtel today notified the district deputies that they must enforce a section of a law passed by the recent Legislature, which provides that slabwood, blockwood, ties and sawed cord wood, when sold for use as fuel, become firewood, and shall be sold by the cord or fraction of a cord, and not by the load. He also notified them that coal and ice must be sold by weight. Mr. Buchtel has an opinion from Attorney-General Brown that these sections of the statutes are mandatory.

The district sealers have been instructed to notify the firms in their territories of the interpretation of the law, and within a reasonable time, if they do not observe it, to take legal action. Mr. Buchtel says in the letter to the deputies:

"A wagon holding 3/4 of a cord of 16-inch slabwood may be properly billed as 96 cubic feet, or as 3/4 of a cord, the measurements being figured of course, upon the wood in the short lengths, and after piling."

Similar laws have been in force in Portland for seven years, and the one passed by the recent legislature gives the remainder of the state the same protection.
