# Uncle Silas Says.

When you go into business for ourself, Amos, don't plan to grab he earth, because you couldn't if you ould and you shouldn't if you could. The good book says: "The earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof, world and they that dwell there-"and, therefore, no man can take himself more of the profits of iness or of the bounties of nature than is needed for the comfort and security against want of his family and himself without doing wrong to all others associated with him. By all means be liberal in dealing with your employes in every way, especially in the matter of wages. You will plan to gain by your business, day by day, nere than enough of money to carry it on right and provide properly for your family and yourself. You will want to save up something constant-ly as a safeguard against misfortune that may come to you at any time, and also, the possibility of want in old age, and it is but just that you should pay those who work for you, and therefore enable you to do so, as much for their services as you can possibly afford, that they, also, may thus provide for their future safety and comfort, even though by so doing you may have to share your profits with them. It is not sufficient pay that will only enable the employe to that will only enable the employe to live to work, for that is no more than you would do for your horse. Remember, my boy, that there is more than enough in the world for us all, and that no one, who is temperate, honest and industrious would ever want for the necessities of life if employers would only smother their savage greed and be just and fair.

When I was a boy and lived at

home one of our neighbors, who was a regular mossback, was always growling about weeds in his fields, and wondering why there was so few in ours. One day he asked father how he managed to kill weeds so effectively, and I can never forget the answer. It was this: More important than killing them is not to have them kill, which can be accomplished by right management. First, prevent the weeds from going to seed, then prevent weed seed from being brought to the farm. In case of per ennial weeds prevent them from making a top growth, and thus finally the undergrowth parts. Annual weeds are short lived, matur-ing their seed and then dying within a year. On the other hand, biennial weeds live two years, during the first year growing slowly and producing a toproot with leaves close to the ground, but the second year they send up flower stems that produce seed and then die. As the biennial and annual weeds reproduce themselves by seed alone, it is necessary to observe the first two principles in their control. Perennial weeds, on the other hand,, produce each year underground parts, which live over the next year and produce top growth These weeds propogate themselves by their underground parts as well as their seeds, and even if prevented from going to seed, keep on growing Now, while annual weeds may be destroyed by cutting them down, the others will grow again, and the only way to get rid of them is to dig them up and keep at it until they are utterly destroyed, especially in the fence corners, which are natural breeding places for them.

To common people like ourselves, avoidance of the payment of any just debt seems disgraceful. We want what is due us from others, and it is is to pay promptly. We are taxed for the public benefit in which we share, and we consider out taxes as much an in debtness as we do our store bills. I was greatly astonished recently by statement in the newspapers that many rich people in St. Louis had, in ways but little short of criminal, flimflammed the tax-assessors, amounting in the aggregate to hundreds of thousands of dollars, and, when con fronted with the evidence of their de linquency, didn't seem to realize that they had done anything wrong. Well, that reminds me of a story which illustrates the fact that he is prone to regard taxes more in the nature of a gift to the public than a bona fide debt, and he is inclined to avoid pay ing them if he can do so by any sort of subterfuge without publicity. At a social gathering at the Washington residence of the Chief Justice Chase when he was secretary of the war, the subject of taxation having moted, a distinguished naval officer present, who was very wealthy, said he had paid all taxes on his property that had been assessed, but no in-come tax had been demanded. I have considerable property which brings me a yearly rental, but the taxgatherers have not spotted it. I do not know whether I ought to let things go on that way or not. What would you do if you were in my place?" There was a merry twinkle in the eyes of Mr. Chase as he answered: "I think it is the duty of every man to live unspotted as long as he can.'

Gertrude have you been gathering honey today from the beehives for your school mates, who are coming next week to spend a portion of their summer vacation with you. Well, last night I read in a magazine an article on bees by an alleged scientist, in which he sounds a solemn warning against the use of honey as food on account of the supposed danger of contracting therefrom awful diseases, the germs of which the bees (might) gather during their contact with vegctation. Heretofore ever ybody has thought of bees only as sucking pure nectar from the most fragrant and beautiful flowers, and this statement by Mr. Highbrow that they do not use sanitary methods in their work of gathering the nectar, or germproof containers in which to store the hon-ey, is decidedly surprising. Wild hon-ey has represented to the average mind the pure distillation of pure blossoms, and the product fit for a king, or, better still, sweet young girls, such as are coming to visit you.

It is possible to provide the bee with clean material from which it can make its comb, but how melancholy it is to think that the bee, so wise in all other things, when left to its own devices, is as careless of sanitary measures and of public health as the lairymen was before science under look to legislate the microbes out of laryhen was before science under-look to legislate the microbes out of the milk. However, we'll take our chances on the honey proposition and if it makes your guests sick 1", pay the doctor bills cheerfully.

There are two important methods of economy that have long been neglected in most parts of the country. They are good roads and proper care of rainfall. When roads are quagmires hat much needed rain is kept from the fields. When streams are swollenged. he fields. When streams are swollen tot only do they do an immense damage to property, but they waste water that should be of use in running mills and in irrigating farms. We are a vatchful people. At a time when all the textile industries are in sorest need of dyestuffs, this country wastes yeary season, enough of the raw ma-terial to supply every mill in the country for a year to come with the best quality of dyes. We waste our energy on bad roads, and because hey are bad the farmer's crops some times rot in the field while the city people pay double what the farmer yould be glad to get for those same crops. We waste our natural resources, our food supplies, our brains, unbition and energy. Every movement which promises a better was of nent which promises a better use o these things is a movement for nat-onal advancement and prosperity As the farmer or merchant lives more and more to himself the worse off he is, both for his personal good and that of those around him. We do not need more time nearly so much as we do a more wholesome desire to spend what we have wisely and un-selfishly.
