Staying At It.

Among the prophecies of Senator Stone of Missouri as "Old Bill Stone" and who was in Portland this week, is one to the effect that prohibition and woman suffrage are bound to win. As a matter of fact, Senator Stone is not an ardent advocate of either of these movements. "But," he says, with the fine, "lone" lazy drawl that gives point and emphasis prediction and story, "the suffragists and prohibitionists are just going to stay at it until they get it." This thing of "staying at it," Senator Stone considers alone the most commendable practice in life. It is the epitome of all the means of success. If at first you don't succeed, why, stay at it he says. Everything comes to him who stays at it. Success is simply the prize for staying at it. Genius is an infinite ability to stay at it.

"Look," says Senator Stone, "what staying at it has done for the suffragists throughout the country." There was a touch of enthusiasm in the drawl. "And look what staying at it is doing for prohibitionists in Missouri." (Utter lack of enthusiasm noted here). "Why the last time they tried it, the wets beat 'em two to one in Missouri; but they are staying at it from Missouri. Well, I'm from Missouri. But they'll stay at it. Still, while Senator Stone admires the suffragists for their stayativeness he deprecates their habit of waylaying and holding up congressmen.

"Now," he says, "look at me—" (an unnecessary injunction, because "Bill Stone's six feet of angularity, his care free walk, and genial, almost tender, face get a deal of looking at whatever he is)—"I'm out for rest, recreation and relaxation. And what do I find? The suffragists staying at it to the extent of demanding my views on their propaganda. What am I going to tell them? I'll tell them a story. Senator Stone declares that President Wilson will have no opposition in the Democratic convention, and opines that he will be re-elected without difficulty. But what about Bryan? Hasn't he the stayative quality largely developed? "Oh, Bryan," said the Senator; "he'll just continue saying at it."
