Beware of Fruit Peddlers.

Several complaints have been made about fruit peddlers who come into this county with fruitalt is not generally known that some of them are buying culled fruit and bringing it to Itlamook County, selling it at prices that is altogether out of proportion to what it is worth, to far aers and others. For instance, they have been selling culled fruit at from \$1.25 to \$1.50 a box, while, at the same time, the grocery and fruit stores in this city have been selling good fruit at from 75c. to 85c. a box. We simply mention this to put people on their guard, for quite a number of our citizens have been "soaked" buying cultured fruit from peddlers. There is an abundance of fruit this year, selling at remarkably low figures, and there is no reason why our citizens should be paying fancy prices for culled fruit when they can obtain the best at less noney at the local merchants.
