### Beware of Fruit Peddlers.

Several complaints have been made about fruit peddlers who come into this county with fruit. It is not generally known that some of them are buying culled fruit and bringing it to Tillamook County, selling it at prices that is altogether out of proportion to what it is worth, to farmers and others. For instance, they have been selling culled fruit at from \$1.25 to \$1.50 a box, while, at the same time, the grocery and fruit stores in this city have been selling good fruit at from 75c. to 85c. a box. We simply mention this to put people on their guard, for quite a number of our citizens have been "soaked" buying culled fruit from peddlers. There is an abundance of fruit this year, selling at remarkably low figures, and there is no reason why our citizens should be paying fancy prices for culled fruit when they can obtain the best at less money at the local merchants.

### Early Settler Passes Away.

We have to announce the death of Mrs. Thos. Jenkins, which occurred on Monday morning at her home on the Wilson river. Deceased came to Tillamook 42 years ago and she was 97 years of age last April. She crossed the plains in 1841 with her parents, who settled in Yamhill County, and in 1870 was married to Thos. Jenkins. She had been previously married to Mr. Witherell. She leaves a husband and eight children to mourn her death. Her children are Mrs. Solie Smith, Mrs. Dan Murphy, Mrs. James Murphy, Emmett Jenkins, Eugene Jenkins, Miss Vine Jenkins, Miss K. Witherell and George Witherell. One son William Witherell was drowned some few years ago.

Deceased had been quite sick for some time, and her death did not come as a surprise. She was a woman who was well liked in the community and her death deprives the county of another of its early settlers.

Funeral services were held at the home on Tuesday afternoon, conducted by Rev. D. L. Shrode, which was largely attended by friends and neighbors.

### High School Secures Agricultural Expert as Teacher.

The School Board elected Mr. Geo. F. Sanders to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Jesse Crenshaw. Mr. Sanders is a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural College, where he specialized in soils and horticulture with considerable work in dairying. Since his graduation he has been engaged in practical farming at The Dalles, Oregon. He also had charge of the school gardens of the schools of The Dalles last spring.

Mr. Sanders is prepared to teach practical farming, a course in soils and general agriculture will be given this fall and other courses as there is a demand for them. It is hoped that young men from outside the town of Tillamook will take advantage of this opportunity. Since the county high school went into effect, high school work is free to any resident of the county. Young men of some maturity will be permitted to enroll in these special courses even though they have not graduated from the grammar school.

Other courses will be given a more practical side. More general carpentry will be included in the manual training course. Mechanical drawing will be added for those who want it.

### School Opens Tuesday.

The School Board decided to open school Tuesday, Sept. 7, instead of Monday, which is Labor Day.

All pupils and especially all children who will be in the beginning class should enter on this day. The teachers will be very glad to have the mothers of younger children especially come with them so that facts regarding age, previous schooling, etc. may be more readily and accurately obtained.

High school students, especially those entering high school this year, are urged to confer with the principal regarding their courses before the opening of school. Several new courses will be given if a sufficient number register for them. It is necessary to know as soon as possible whether they were wanted in order to make a program.

The principal will be glad to confer with parents regarding lines of work that they wish their children to follow, or that they are best fitted for, so that courses most suitable may be selected. He will be in the office in the high school building Friday and Saturday afternoons and all day Monday.
