The grand jury having completed its work on Wednesday, submitting a report to Judge Bagley. The report appliments the county officials and commends that the county court .vy a tax of half a mill to improve nd make addition to the court house.

he report is as follows: We, the grand jury of the County is Tillamook hereby respectfully reort that we have now concluded our bors and request that we be disharged from further service. We ave examined into the condition nd management of the public prions of the county, and into the continuous of the continuous of the continuous of the continuous of the continuous management of the continuous m ition and management of the offices ertaining to the courts of justice in ac county, and also into the condiion and management of public records and buildings of the county, and ve hereby certify that we have found he same to be in good order and the jubic records well kept; but would espectfully recommend to the Honcounty, Oregon, as follows:

First, that the steam pipes in the pasement of the county court house se covered with asbestos in order to conserve the heat generated by the urnace for heating the county court louse; and

Second, that the County Court beginning with the county tax levy for he year 1915, levy one-half mill each year until sufficient taxes shall be aised to make a suitable addition to he said court house, for the reason hat some of the offices of most imortance therein are becoming crowded, and from present indications it will not be more than two years before the said offices shall be insuffiient in size to do the work necessary lone therein
