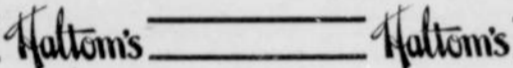

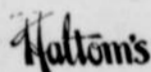

Taxes Collected Amount to \$390,478.

Sheriff Crenshaw has collected \$390,478.21 in taxes on the 1914 rolls, leaving a balance of \$27,250.89 to be collected, which is now delinquent. The first half and straight payments amounted to \$253,584.92 and the last half \$136,893.29. It cost more to collect the tax in two payments, but the figures show that a large number of the taxpayers avail themselves of the opportunity to pay their taxes in two installments. Considering the fact that money is tight, there is only a comparatively small amount of taxes delinquent out of the total of \$417,720.10 levied in the county.

Water Permits in Tillamook.

During the quarter ending July 31, 1915, the State Engineer issued 152 permits for the appropriation of water, under which it is proposed to irrigate 23,143 acres of land, develop 352 horsepower and construct 15 reservoirs. These permits will require the construction of 210 miles of canals and pipe lines and an estimate expenditure of \$891,242.00.

The following permits were issued in Tillamook County:

W. S. Cone, of Bay City, secured a permit to develop 24 horsepower, diverting water from Mapes Creek in Sec. 31, T 1 N, R 9 W.

Ralph Welsh, of Blaine, for the irrigation of 6 acres of land, diverting water from an unnamed creek in Sec. 30, T 3 S, R 8 W.

H. M. Farmer, of Beaver, for the irrigation of 20 acres, diverting water from an unnamed creek in Sec. 1, T 4 S, R 10 W.

Wm. G. Tait, of Tillamook, for municipal supply, diverting water from unnamed creek in Sec. 32, T 1 S, R 10 W.

Drowning at the Bar.

Another drowning occurred at the Nestucca bar, when C. O. Woolsey lost his life in the breakers yesterday afternoon. Mr. Woolsey and a young man by the name of George Corall, of Woods were fishing too far out on the bar and lost control of their boat. After the boat had filled with water the younger man caught hold of the side of the boat and retained his hold until rescued. Joe Everest and a boy by the name of Buckbee saw the predicament their fellow fishermen were in and with a heart and a gigantic amount of nerve manned a boat and buffeted the waves until the stranded boat was reached. They then brought the young man, who by this time had become nearly exhausted, to shore. Mr. Woolsey was not seen after the first trouble. The accident occurred about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Mr. Woolsey is well known to many of the older citizens, he having lived in the South end of Tillamook county a number of years ago and about a year ago returned and took up the occupation of fishing. He was 50 years of age and has a son living at Sheridan, who was notified by wire last evening.—Courier.
