The County Budget. The County Court will take up the matter of the county budget at its meeting next week. The budget, as compiled last year by the County Court and the advisory board, totaled \$172,000, made up as follows: Road District No. 1 \$52,500 Road District No. 2 67,000 Road District No. 3 52,500 After the budget meeting the court took into consideration a few improvements and slightly revised some of the items, and levied a road tax for \$188,530.55. It seems that the court does not favor an advisory board, so places desiring road improvements will have to make their wants known before the court next week or to the county commissioners or county judge. From what we can gather the County Court is inclined to reduce the levy for road work next year.

Tugboat Founders in Storm.

The tug boat Meta M, owned by Harry Bell, of Nehalem sank at her dock during the storm Sunday night. Mr. Bell was aboard the tug at 10 o'clock Sunday night to look her over, and at 4 o'clock Monday morning, when he was ready to start up the river for a tow of logs, he found she had gone to the bottom. At daylight she was dragged to shore, several hundred feet from the dock, and beached.

A hole was found in one of the planking just below water line and it is thought the tug fouled on a snag during the storm. She will be ready for service in a day or two.

Last Friday afternoon the high school football team clashed with the town team on the football gridiron at the Stillwell park in a scoreless game. Both teams played hard and neither seemed to have the advantage when the game closed with the ball in possession of the high school on their 30 yard line.

WOODBURN HAS BIG FIRE

Gasoline in Garage Explodes, Eight Autos Being Destroyed.

Salem, Or., Oct. 26.—Fire of unknown origin destroyed Dimick's garage at Woodburn tonight. The fire was discovered at 11 o'clock. Eight automobiles and several motor-cycles in the building were destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$25,000.

Gasoline stored in the building exploded and blazing portions of the building were thrown broadcast. The fire was prevented from spreading to nearby buildings.

NEHALEM PROJECT ADVANCE

South Jetty Nearing Completion and North Restle to Start.

Arrangements are under way to start the north jetty at the mouth of the Nehalem, work on the extension of the South jetty, which has been under way since last season, being drawn to a close rapidly. The first work on the South jetty was carried on by the Port of Nehalem and the United States engineers took over the project on a co-operative plan.

James S. Pholems, assistant engineer in the office of Major Williams, Corps of Engineers, U. S. A., was at Nehalem Tuesday to make an inspection of the work. It is reported that there is a steady improvement in the depth of water at the entrance, and it is confidently felt that with the building of the North jetty sufficient depth will be available for the demands of commerce there.
