Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, did, in pursuance of notice thereof duly given, on the first day of November, 1915, make a re-assessment of the proportionate share of the cost of the making of the following improvements, to-wit:

The improvement of the South side of Second Street from the Northeast corner of Lot 2, Block 2, Maple Grove Addition, West to Third Avenue West.

Both sides of Third Street, from Stillwell Avenue to Third Avenue West; The South side of Fourth Street, from Third Avenue West to Sixth Avenue West;

The North side of Fifth Street from Third Avenue West to Sixth Avenue West;

The West side of First Avenue West from Third Street to Fourth Street; Both sides of Second Avenue West from Second Street to Fourth Street; The East side of Third Avenue West from Second Street to Fourth Street.

The West side of Third Avenue West from Fourth Street to Fifth Street; Both sides of Fifth Avenue West from Fourth Street to Fifth Street, and, The East side of Fifth Avenue West from Fourth Street to Fifth Street, all in Tillamook City, Oregon.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

A most successful potato show and fair was held at Redmond.

Work in the Crater Lake national park has been terminated for the season.

Cougars have been seen within the past few days almost within the city limits of Marshfield.

Fire destroyed the entire business portion of Merlin, a small town nine miles north of Grants Pass.

Brigadier S. Young, of Ada, O., supreme chancellor of the Knights of Pythias, will visit Oregon next month.

An educational system, patterned largely after the system used at San Quentin, will be established at the state prison in the near future.

Electrification of the Southern Pacific railway lines between Whiteson and Corvallis is to be pushed just as rapidly as weather conditions will permit.

With the selection of Salem for the holding of next year's annual convention, the Oregon Baptist association closed its annual convention at Eugene.

Mrs. George W. McMath, of Portland, was elected president of the Oregon Co. of Mothers and Parent-Teacher Association, in session at Corvallis.

Genevieve Andrews, aged 14 years, and Genevieve Foster, aged 17 years, both committed from Portland, have escaped from the state industrial school for girls.

A new hotel and a number of small cottages will be built at Lehman springs, a recreation and health resort in the Blue mountains, about 40 miles south of Pendleton.

The Oregon Countryman, an agricultural journal published by the students in the school of agriculture at the Oregon agricultural college, has issued the first number of the year.

The purchase of three Southern Pacific sawmills, each with a capacity of 75,000 feet a day, by W. J. Zimmerman, of Portland, of the Zimmerman-Wells-Brown company, was announced in Eugene.

The residents of Baker are circulating petitions requesting that an election be held in the near future to vote on the question of issuing \$125,000 in bonds to finance the construction of a high school.

The government survey of the proposed road through the forest reserve connecting Hood River valley with the Barlow road on the south side of Mt. Hood, covering a distance of 25 miles, has been completed.

Twenty-eight cases, carried up on appeal from the trial courts of Umatilla, Baker, Malheur, Wasco, Gilliam and Walla Walla counties, are on the docket of the supreme court for hearing at Pendleton this week.

The interstate commerce commission has ordered a hearing at Portland, November 19, before Examiner Butler, on the complaint of the Salem Iron Works company against the Southern Pacific company.

Preparatory to a campaign for a \$370,000 bond issue in Coos county for highway improvement the county court has accepted the tender of the services of an engineer made by the United States office of public roads.

The bridge across the Willamette river at Salem between Marion and Polk counties was ordered closed at once by the county courts of Marion and Polk counties. The bridge was condemned as unsafe by the state highway department.

Several carloads of moss have been shipped from Linn county in the past two months and moss gathering has been quite an industry in some parts of the county this summer. The moss was sent to California to be used by nurseries in packing fruit trees.

The Iowa decision, by which a United States district court compels the railroads to accept liquor shipments for persons residing in dry Iowa, may mean that the Oregon law limiting receipts will not stand either, is the opinion of R. P. Hutton, state superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league.

The body of Dr. Clayton L. Ransom, of Mill City, who disappeared September 17 while on a hunting expedition in the mountains of the Jackson Hole country in Wyoming, was found by searching parties near the place where he had been camping with Bell B. Judd, a guide. Ransom had been shot and killed.

The pen of White Leghorns entered by the Oregon agricultural college has clinched the hold on first prize in the Panama-Pacific International egg-laying contest. The latest report issued covering the first 10 1/2 months of the contest showed that the three Oregon pens, White Leghorns, Oregons and Barred Plymouth Rocks, are leading in the order named.

The Portland chamber of commerce has sent all Oregon commercial clubs and chambers of commerce a circular letter concerning the observance of Oregon day at the Panama-Pacific International exposition. Oregon day is set for Saturday, October 30, and it is urged that all citizens of the state, who have any idea of visiting the Pacific fair, make their arrangements to be present at that time.
