Death of Mrs. Christensen

We are exceedingly sorry to have to announce the death of Mrs. Kathryn Christensen which occurred at seven o'clock this (Thursday) evening. Deceased was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. Hiner and wife of Fred W. Christensen, and was 33 years of age. It seems that some months ago she was cleaning the sink with lye when the fumes went into her system. It was thought that she would eventually get better of it, but the past few weeks she grew worse and lapsed into unconsciousness on Wednesday. The deceased was an accomplished musician and her death has caused profound sorrow in the community. *

Funeral services next Monday at two o'clock at Presbyterian church to which friends are invited, and services at grave private. *

Work on Bayocean Road Ordered to Stop.

It was a great surprise to the business men and citizens when they were informed that County Judge A. M. Hare had given orders to suspend all work on the Bayocean road. The amount appropriated for the work this year was \$10,250.00 and about half of this has been expended. The County Court had entered into an agreement with the Bayocean people to operate the dredge and throw up a road on the south side of the bay, with the understanding that the balance of the appropriation should be used for that purpose. After going to considerable expense in fixing up the dredge, and having only started on the work a few weeks since, they are ordered to close down. The reason for doing so is that road district No. 2 has expended all its road funds, and the money appropriated for Bayocean was used elsewhere. *

Bayocean is the only settled locality in the county without a road, and notwithstanding the vast

amount of money expended there in improvements, and strenuous efforts made to procure a way out, it hardly looks fair to take from Bayocean half of the appropriation made for that road, when the county had the exceedingly large sum of \$188,000 for road work.
