School News Items.

The report for the month, ending Nov. 5th shows that there is an increase of 10 pupils enrolled, and an increase of the same number in average daily attendance. The total enrollment is now 407. The per cent of attendance was 98, and 289 pupils were neither absent nor late. The best attendance records are in the high school again this month. The group of 15 Sophomore boys registered with Mr. Crockatt again registered 100 per cent. The Freshmen boys registered with Mr. Sanders and the Freshmen girls registered with Miss McKown have scored 99.6. The Junior class registered with Miss Macklin scored 99.9 and the Seniors with Mrs. Hanson scored 98.7. The lowest record in the high school was 98 with a group of 9 Freshmen girls registered to Miss Ueland. In the grades the sixth grade won the score of 99.7. The second grade came next with 99 and the fifth, fourth, third and first all scored 98 or better. Twenty-three parents visited the schools during the month and three members of the school board all spent some time inspecting work in the different rooms.

State Biologist, William L. Finley, has written that he will be unable to lecture in Tillamook, Nov. 19th, as was announced, but will probably be here two weeks later, Dec. 3rd.

The Parent Teacher's meeting has been set for Friday evening, Nov. 19. There will be a program by the members of the school, reports by committees and other business. Supt. Onthank will report on the result of a number of tests, giving to the pupils of the school during the last few weeks. The tests show graphically the standing of the different grades in the fundamentals of Arithmetic and Language. A report will also be given showing the results of the dental inspection of the children which was made at the close of school last spring.

The Christmas vacation, this year will include the time between the dates of Dec. 18th and Jan. 2nd inclusive.

Thanksgiving, Nov. 25, is a holiday and school will close, Friday Nov. 26.

The last spelling test given in the high school shows 56 out of 96 perfect and the greater part of the remainder 90 or better. The results were very much better than those of previous tests.

Dr. R. T. Boals has given to the high school a splendid X-ray machine together with X-ray tubes and complete equipment. This is an expensive piece of apparatus and the high school is very fortunate to secure it for use in Physics work. Up to this time the school has had no suitable equipment for work in electricity and radio-activity.

A number of people have recently donated magazines and books to the school library.

Benly Stam, who graduated from the Tillamook High School in 1913, is attending Willamette University.

Frank Ebesson, a graduate of last year, entered the Oregon State Normal School, where he is preparing himself to be a teacher.

The sixth grade won the pennant for the best average showing in progress in Palmer Penmanship during the last few weeks, in a contest which included this grade and the fourth and fifth. The fourth grade come out second in the contest. The fourth grade is holding over the fifth grade in the spelling contest between these two grades. The fifth, however, having better success in the last few days.

A fine collection of books has been loaned by the City Library to the school library for the use of the pupils. These books are circulated and cared for during the stay at the school, just as are the school library books. Many of these are of much value as supplementary reading in direct connection with class work.

TILLAMOOK COW TESTING ASSOCIATION.

Honor list of all cows producing over 250 pounds of butter fat in six months ending September, 30th.

There are many cows besides the above list that came very close to the 250 lb. mark but a stop had to be made somewhere so 250 lbs. was set as the standard. The advantages to be gained by following up the testing of your herd year after year are many. The farmer should keep books on every item of his business and the main items on the dairy farm are the

cows. Farm management surveys have shown conclusively that the success in dairy farming hangs, more than anything else, on the quality of the cows kept.

The Testing Association is the cheapest way of keeping records on the individual cows and it is hoped that next year many more will avail themselves of this means of keeping track of their business. Every dairyman in Tillamook should belong to a Testing Association and apply the knowledge that he gains through it.
