SEA ENCROACHES ON BAR VIEW.

Citizens Have Strenuous Time Saving Property.

Great swells dashing at high tide against the shore in front of the Bar View hotel Sunday ate their way 12 feet further into the hotel yard, and with less than 30 feet between the hotel and the ocean, arrangements to bring a moving outfit from Tillamook to take the hotel back to higher ground. A storm at sea lashed the surface of the ocean, and the tides, higher now than usual, have combined to make the situation precarious.

Several tent frames on shore became prey to the waves Sunday, and several families living in cottages between the hotel and the Tillamook jetty moved their houses back from danger and the sites are now covered by the ocean. J. R. Snidow and S. Butts got their houses away just in time.

The new Tillamook jetty is believed to be responsible for changing the course of the tides' actions.

The Southern Pacific Railroad tracks are yet 150 feet from the new shore line, but there is much soft earth intervening and the sea has been eating its way about 30 feet a day.

On Monday the angry breakers were only 15 feet from the \$8000 Bar View hotel that night and work was planned to begin at daybreak to move the hotel to higher ground. Fear was felt that if the work is not accomplished before another high tide strikes in the afternoon, the waters will do the work and probably damage the hotel beyond repair.

The Tent City here has been demolished, many of the 40 or 50 frame bases being carried away. Dr. Wise's dental annex is among those places which are no more.

R. E. Jackson and T. R. Mills were two more residents who moved their houses to higher ground before the tide came in or the dashing waters would have covered the first floors of their homes.

Rock Dumped On Jetty.

The tide continued to run so high that it was decided to dump 24 carloads of rock at the shore end of the jetty, which is about 100 feet from Business House's Imperiled.

All business houses are imperiled except one or two and it is feared the postoffice, the dance hall, bowling alleys and poolroom may be washed away by the waves, which at present are cutting into the bank at the rate of from 10 to 20 feet a day.

Railway engineers and trackmen have been on the ground for several days past and are taking daily measurements of the washout as it advances toward their right of way.

Early last week the residents now in Bar View, together with some of the property holders who arrived to look after their interests, rifled the bank, but the effort proved futile, as the waves cut under the work and literally ate up the bank, which is of loose sand.

Years ago the waves came up to a rocky bluff 800 feet north of the point to which they came early in the season and as they receded from the bluff line, in times past, the sands piled up, and it is on this sandy fill, or beach extension, that most of the summer resort has been built.

A large number of the cottages lie outside of the district which is threatened and will not be affected, but should the waves continue to cut in at the same rate as at present for another week almost the entire business portion will be washed away.

Bar View's heroic defenders Tuesday "stemmed the tide," when they piled trees and brush and all kinds of undergrowth and driftwood on the sands in front of the Bar View hotel, and the rising tide was defeated. Only one big breaker during the day swept over the entire beach, giving the defenders and all parts of this noted Summer resort a drenching for the moment.

No effort was made to move the hotel as planned owing to the cost, which Dr. Wise, the owner, figured far beyond the possibility of damage by the angry waters which have been creeping towards the structure rapidly with each incoming tide.

Late Tuesday afternoon the wind fell and the sea dropped back a few feet, but the hotel and other properties are far from being out of danger yet.

Beach Line Changed for Miles.

Since the building of the Government jetty at the mouth of Tillamook Bay, the topography of the beach line for several miles on either side has been materially altered. The most pronounced change is noticeable directly at the shore end of the jetty and at a spot 150 feet south.

Since early this summer, when the jetty got far enough out to change the currents, the beach sand on the south side has been slowly disappearing, with the result that the high-tide mark was brought in from 200 feet to within 50 feet of the Bar View Hotel. Little concern was felt during the summer months for property lining the shore at this point, it being generally felt that a reverse action could be expected that would fill out the beach again.

However, these expectations were never fulfilled, and now, with the annual high tides flooding higher than they have for the past several years, houses are being moved to places of safety, and hundreds of visitors lin-

ing the shore at each high tide see the earth bordering the sands crumble away at the rate of ten feet each hour of the maximum flood.

Sea Plays Havoc With Beach.

Since Saturday, when the highest tides, aided by the force of a storm at sea, started dashing against the unprotected shore line just out from the Bar View hotel the beach has disappeared for a length of more than 75 feet, and small trees, outbuildings and tent frames have been uprooted, washed out and ground into the mass of debris that crests each foamy breaker.

The long, steady roll of billows from the open sea with unspent energy have done the damage to the well known bathing beach at Bar View—sometimes breaking against the soft bank with a concussion that sends spray into the air for 50 feet and removes huge slices from the shore.

The Ralph Ackley Land Company and the Bar View Hotel, owned and operated by Dr. W. A. Wise, of Portland, will be the heaviest losers through the action of this fall's tides, while several small property holders are losing their home sights. Numerous small cottages and tents have been moved to a place of safety, while the action of Captain Farley of the United States Coast Guards, in dumping carload after carload of small rock into the water at the end of the jetty, has doubtless prevented the undermining of the track leading to the jetty and the beautiful summer homes that surmount the hills at this point.

Hotel Difficult to Move.

Government engineers, in charge of the jetty construction here, do not deny that the action of the water is due in a measure to the position of the huge affair, and it is as if Father Neptune were engaged at the work of man in thus puncturing his side with a two mile structure of monstrous piers and tons of rock, and was determined to wreck vengeance.

The Bar View Hotel is a frame structure of about 20 rooms. A large dining room, a delicatessen and bakery, serve to make it a large undertaking to move and the several fireplaces and masonry foundations will hinder the work. It was the intention of the management to have it moved across the tracks of the Southern Pacific temporarily and later, after the present storm has sufficiently subsided, to put it on their property about three blocks north near the lake.
