Judge Wolverten in the Federal Court Monday denied the application of the Brunswick-Balks-Collender Company for a temporary restraining order against the District Attorneys and Sheriffs of 25 counties of Oregon from enforcing the Sunday blue law pending a hearing for a permanent injunction.

It will be remembered that the fire in the barn originated by spontaneous combustion in the hay, and is the first barn in the county ever saved after fire broke out in that manner. The barn being 1350 feet from the nearest hydrant the hose had to be carried over low swamp by hand, the hydrant broke and it became necessary to lay out 650 feet more of the hose to the next hydrant.

Parent Teachers' Association to Meet Friday.

The Parent Teachers' Association will meet Friday night at 7:30 at the High School, for the second regular meeting of the year. There will be a program of members from the second fourth and eighth grades and from the high school. Mrs. Burge will present a short paper on methods of teaching primary reading and will demonstrate the method in use in Tillamook, with a class of primary children. Mr. Sanders will speak on teaching Agriculture in the upper grades and high school. There will be read a paper from the Oregon Congress of mothers on the care of the teeth of children, and Mr. Onthank will report the results of the examination of the teeth of the children in the local schools, which was made late last spring. Mr. Onthank will also describe and give the results of several tests of the language ability of the children in the different grades. Every one is invited to attend these meetings of the Parent Teachers' Association, parents are especially urged to do so.

Is It More Bluff?

District Attorney T. H. Goynes has received a letter from Attorney Frank S. Grant, of Portland, who threatens to bring suit against the county on account of the action of the County Court changing amounts of the budget last year. Part of the letter reads:

"Last December when the budget was adopted, under the item road purposes, I find the following: Roads, bridges, supervisors' salaries, repairs, machinery and supplies, \$172,000.00, but I do not find the specific items which make up the grand total. However, these specific items were published in the newspapers as a part of the budget and they were read before the taxpayers' meeting and the advisory committee, a resolution was adopted by the taxpayers at that meeting, directing that these specific items should be incorporated in the records of the County Court. This has never been done. After the taxpayers' meeting, and after the County Court had agreed to the budget as approved by the taxpayers, I am informed that the County Court increased the estimate \$3,000.00 for one half mile new construction of Bay-ocean road, from \$3,000.00 to \$6,000.00. The people that I represent contend that the specific items, making the grand total for road purposes should have been incorporated in the records of the County Court as a part of the original budget, and they further contend that where the budget has been approved by the taxpayers, and by the County Court at the taxpayers' meeting, it is unlawful for the County Court to increase any specific item in the budget, and they further contend that where a budget provides a specific amount for a specific purpose that it is unlawful to expend more than the amount estimated."

Attorney Grant then goes on to suggest that, to enable him to bring suit, that District Attorney Goynes stipulate that the items published were part of the budget, which most everybody knows were not part of the budget, but published by the local newspapers for the taxpayers' information where the road money would be expended.

Attorney Goynes has refused to make a stipulation of that nature, and informed Attorney Grant that the County Court acted under the advice of the Attorney General.

Governor Withycombe Issues Thanksgiving Day Proclamation.

Salem, Or., Nov. 15.—Calling upon the people of Oregon to "tender thanks to him that watches over all for the bounties and blessings by him bestowed," Governor Withycombe today in a proclamation designate Thursday, November 25, as Thanksgiving Day. The proclamation reads: "Whereas, the year 1915 is drawing to a close, and for Oregon and the United States, its months have been full of blessings of peace, in welcoming contrast to the horrors of the great war which has ravaged so many of the less fortunate countries of the world; and

"Whereas, each and every one of us has much for which to be grateful, individually and as citizens of our country and our state, and

"Whereas, it is a time honored custom for the Governors of the several states to join with the President of the United States in proclaiming a day of statewide and National thanksgiving;

from their labor and on that day tender thanks to him who watches over all for the bounties and blessings by him bestowed.

"In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the State of Oregon to be hereunto affixed, this fifteenth day of November, 1915.

James Withycombe, Governor."
