At a meeting of the school district on Saturday, the budget published by the board was adopted and 3 1/2 mills tax levy was made. The board was authorized to enter into a contract with Elmer Hoag to transport pupils from the Tillamook river district at \$25.00 per month.

Ida Hadley vs. Ed Hadley Jr. and Lizzie Hadley and Ed Hadley, sr. is a suit filed in the circuit court of a transfer of real estate. The plaintiff alleges that the defendants conspired against her and induced her to convey certain real property, which she is now seeking to have transferred to her.

Senator Geo. E. Chamberlain is advised that the forestry service is unable to comply with a request for aid in constructing a road between Sheridan and Tillamook through the Tillamook forest service. But \$20,000 is available for road construction in Oregon this year and this is being expended on roads in the Cascade, Deschutes and Umpqua forests.

The second of the three school semester divisions ended Wednesday as the school is given both Thursday and Friday as holidays. Report cards were given out on Wednesday and on next Monday the last division of this semester will begin. Only 15 more school days are given before the Christmas vacation, it commencing on the 17th of December and ending on the 3rd of January.

The Kellow barn on the Nestucca river near the Farmers grade, was the victim of the storm Sunday night, when it was blown into the river and carried to Bull's landing, a distance of six miles, before it stranded. The barn contained a horse and buggy, an auto and many other things. The auto and buggy were smashed but after some effort the horse was taken from the building without any injury.

Justice Thompson suspended the sentence in the Hartzell case pending good behavior.

Blank applications for registration of automobile and chauffeurs for annual license for the year of 1916 have been received by Rollie W. Watson from the office of the Secretary of State. All automobiles, as well as chauffeurs who drive their cars for hire must have their licenses to operate their cars after January 1st, 1916, as their present licenses will expire on the last of the year. As there are over 30,000 automobiles in the state your application should be applied for early so that you may get your car numbers early in the year.

The revival meetings which have been held at the Christian church came to a successful close last Sunday night with the biggest gathering for religious services ever held in this city. The gallery had to be used for the first time in the history of the church for church services. 25 additions were obtained and the interest grew as the meetings went along but the Evangelists Jesse and Homer Kellems were engaged for Corvallis meeting this week and had to leave immediately.
