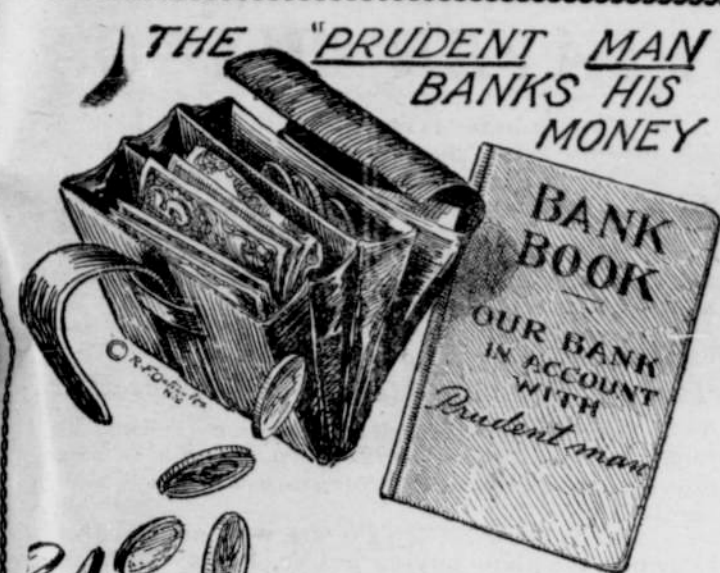

The County Court is in session this week, it being the regular monthly meeting.

J. H. Hicks, of the Tillamook Bay Construction Company, is bringing the outfit in from Sour Grass road having completed the contract with the exception of a little leveling, which is being done with shovels in one of the cuts.

Sheriff Crenshaw left on Sunday morning for Kalspell, Mont. to bring back Carl Dennis, who is wanted in Tillamook county for forging checks on Will Ronecke, of Woods. It was through the efforts of the Bankers' Protective Association that Dennis was arrested.

Stephens had three charges filed against him in the recorder's office, one for selling liquor to a minor, one for allowing a woman to sit in the saloon and having the windows of the saloon screened. He was tried on Monday on the first charge and recorder Aschm found him guilty and fined him \$50.00. The other two cases came up on Wednesday, when Stephens pleaded guilty to both. The recorder fined him \$75.00 on the second charge and \$100.00 on the third. The recorder suspended sentence on the last charge.

Arthur Wallace has rented the opera hall for a basketball floor and has subleased it to the high school and Academy for the same use. The floor will be in much better condition for playing basketball this year than it was last season because there will be no dancing this year to make the floor slippery. Already the high school has equipped the hall and a long season with many outside games is expected. The town team is thinking of securing a game with the Oregon Agricultural College freshmen and the high school has received letters from many schools and organizations which are desirous of playing here.

The weather report of Tillamook city for the month of November, taken by the weather bureau under the direction of Prof. Sanders, of the High School, records a mean maximum temperature of 53.3 Fahrenheit and a mean minimum temperature of 37.6 degrees. The mean temperature was 45.4 degrees. The highest temperature was 64 and the lowest 27 on the 10th when there was a killing frost. The precipitation for the month was 18.97 inches of rain and the heaviest was on the 15th and 16th when 2.33 inches fell in 24 hours. There were 12 partly cloudy days, 13 days in which the sun did not appear, 5 clear days and 4 in which there was no rain.

In the event of her sale it is not thought, she would be continued on the Tillamook run, because of railroad competition.

Timber Men Bring Mandamus Proceedings Against Tillamook County Court.

Mandamus proceedings were instituted in the supreme court on Tuesday by S. V. Anderson of Tillamook, through his attorney Frank Grant, of Portland, to compel the county court of Tillamook County to itemize certain amounts in its estimate of the amount to be raised by taxation for 1916. He contended that the estimate does not comply with the law by itemizing money to be expended for roads, surveys and the district attorney's office. An alternate writ, returnable December 11, was issued by the court.

Judge Hare and Commissioners Owens and McKimms were served with the mandamus papers on Wednesday, who are to appear on the 11th and show cause. The mandamus requires: For road purposes, surveyor's office and district attorney's office, not only the aggregate amounts under said general heads, (1) the amount required for the improvement, (2) or maintenance of each public highway, (3) each road, (4) each street, (5) each bridge, (6) the number of supervisors required, (7) the amount of the salary of each, (8) and the amount of their combined salaries, (9) the amount necessary for repairs on machinery, (10) the amount necessary for supplies; (11) the number of employees in the surveyor's office, (12) the total amount of salaries for said office, (13) the cost of surveys, (14) the cost of engineering; (15) the salary of the District Attorney, (16) cost of supplies for said office, (17) and other expenses of said office, and when said estimate is so prepared, file the same of record in the County Clerk's office, and published the same as prepared, in accordance with the provisions of Sec. 2 of said Act.

It was decided by the county court this morning to fight the case and have Attorney General Brown to appear for the county.

The county court published in the budget what it thought and believed was necessary and in compliance with the law, and about the same form is being used by all other counties in the state. In the matter of road expenditures these have been all itemized by the judge and the county commissioners, which will be submitted at the taxpayers' meeting.

A good deal depends upon what action the Supreme Court takes in

the matter, for the mandamus proceedings does not give the County Court much time to go on if it has to republish the budget.

It is some of the timber interests who are bringing these proceedings, S. V. Anderson signing the complaint for them.
