One of the local garages had trouble with their gasoline tank on Tuesday, due to the high water after the rain. The air valve that allows air to enter the tank when gasoline is drawn, became submerged in water and the tank was consequently filled. A Ford car drew gasoline and filled the car with water, which soon stopped the engine. When the trouble was discovered the garage tank was emptied with much trouble and the water removed. The air valve has been fixed so that air will be secured above any possible water mark.

Quite a number of the school districts, as will be seen by the budget published in this issue, have levied special taxes. The new law, it seems, must have the effect of increasing these special levies, for the school districts have got next to the situation that if they don't levy special taxes, when they do want money they cannot levy it, for the law says: "For each year after 1915 all such tax rates shall be so limited as not to levy a greater amount of revenue than the larger amount levied in either of the two years preceding plus 6 per cent." Is the law acting as a boomerang on those who had this clause inserted? It looks so.

The high tides of this week, coupled with the fact that the danger was increasing at Bar View, caused many people to visit that place in the last few days. On Tuesday about 25 cars were lined up near the scene of the wave washed town and a boatload of people went down to Garibaldi and walked down to Barview. The railroad is working hard to secure their tracks against a washout and they have completed their piling and rock wall in the dangerous part of the washout. The old boat house is the only building outside of the rock wall and it is expected that the next few high tides and seawaves will take away everything that is not protected by the sea wall. When the danger is past there will probably be nothing left out side of the railroad levee along the whole stretch of shore line. Many laborers are working now to save the wreckage of the dance hall and hotel and are hauling the big timbers to a place of safety. Supt. O. T. Burkehalter of the S. P. railroad and engineer F. M. Seipert were in Bar View on Monday looking over the situation. The big waves at high tide are lashed over the jetty with such force that the sand is still being undermined from the big log cabin of Captain Farley. On Tuesday a person could not walk on the jetty as the big waves washed the track all the way.

Wheeler Saw Mill to Start.

It is reported that the Wheeler Lumber Co's saw mill at Wheeler will be started up again in the new year. This mill closed down owing to the lumber market being paralyzed as a result of lumber being placed on the free list.

Stack Up With Slab Wood and Help Our Home Industry.

We are pleased to note that conditions are shaping themselves for a larger and steadier pay roll for the City of Tillamook this winter than has been possible for some time. The A. F. Coats Lumber Co. have recently received into their boom on the Tillamook River a million feet of logs and are getting their railroad line in shape to begin hauling over it to tide water, which will insure a source of raw materials to supply their mill. They contemplate running overtime provided they can find an outlet for their wood which must be disposed of to advantage in order for them to run. At present they are soliciting orders for future deliveries and it behoves everyone to assist as much as he can by placing his order at once with the Mill Company even though he may not be in need of the fuel at this time. Tillamook needs a good pay roll to fill up the slack season when there is not much doing in the chess industry. This company alone has brought in and spent during the past four months a very large sum of money and has under contemplation plans for expending still more money provided it gets the patronage and co-operation they merit. At present they have under construction a large addition to their loading shed and bids are being received for the construction of another concrete dry kiln to be built along the side the one completed last spring; all of which goes to make a larger and better Tillamook.
