Editorial Snap Shots.

Most every body looks upon the action of some of the timbermen in wanting the budget re-published as a lot of foolishness.

Most of those who voted for Dr. Boals voted for the Standard Oil Company's franchise. What kind of a political lineup is that Doc?

How funny, and yet how inconsistent. Bro. Trombley is a Democratic free trader, yet he is opposed to a new industry locating in this city. Isn't he a peach?

Bro. Trombley was the hoodoo in the city election on Monday and it shows that he can't hoodoo the people preaching free trade and then turn around and oppose an industry from locating in this city, especially in publishing misleading statements. He certainly owes the city council an apology for doing so, for he did not give the city dads a square deal.

It wasn't a very magnanimous spirit for a few persons in Fairview to attempt to cut down the Bayocean road appropriation to \$2,000 when that locality swiped \$4,000 from some other locality. In all candor, gentlemen, that wasn't giving a locality without a road a fair shake, after Fairview getting a good piece of concrete road which cost \$18,181.51, was it?

There is some talk of peace in Europe. But until Germany is willing to compensate Belgium for the vast devastation and death caused in that country the war should continue, for when Germany broke her treaty obligations and over ran a peaceful, prosperous country rough with her mighty army, Germany broke all rules of neutrality and civilization and showed that it lost all honor when it said that a scrap of paper did not amount to anything.

Washington County has the good roads spirit. The County Court placed \$137,000 in the budget for roads and 25 road districts voted special taxes, making the total \$200,000 for roads to be expended in that county next year. It is a good investment if some of that amount goes into hard surfacing and we want to give that county a word of good advice: Get the ax and chop off the heads of every road supervisor and make the county one road district. It will stop many leaks in the road fund and good roads will follow.

We want to congratulate the Pomona Grange for recommending the completion of Bayocean road next year, and sanctioning the appropriation for the county agriculturist. Every fair minded person will admit that Bayocean should have a way out and is honestly entitled to a road, for it is the only settled locality in the county that is deprived of a road. In regard to the county agriculturist, we believe he is doing good work and it is to the best interest of the county and the dairy industry to retain him.

Probably some of the voters on Monday overlooked or did not know that the City Council had made proper provisions for the safety of the city in the Standard Oil Co.'s franchises. We will quote the same for their information: "Provided further, that if the said Standard Oil Company shall at any time so conduct its said business on said property that the same shall become a menace to the lives or property of the people of Tillamook City, then this ordinance shall thereupon become null and void."

It appears to be the studied policy of the Portland Journal to belittle and publish base and false reports about Governor Withycombe. The flax industry in the state penitentiary, an industry which every fair minded person should commend, was made a pretext for more abuse being heaped on the governor by that newspaper, which distorted facts and published that which was absolutely false. Secretary of the State Olcott, figured in the false accusation, and it does not reflect to his credit to be dabbling in libelous accusations.

One defect in the local option law showed itself when that law was invoked. It did not provide funds for the enforcement of that law. The same thing happens in the prohibition law. Hence there is some opposition in some counties to the County Courts appropriating money that is necessary to enforce the law. If Tillamook County is any criterion to go by when it was under local option, then it is useless to attempt to enforce the prohibition law unless funds are provided. Bootleggers would have very little fear if it is left to the regular officers to catch them, for when the sheriff or his deputies appear on the scene there is nothing doing.

The conspiracy trial of the officials of the Hamburg-American line by the

Federal authorities shows that Germany was preparing for the war. The evidence shows, and it was admitted as coming from the German government, asking the managing director of the Hamburg-American line if he would do certain things in event of war, which amounted to conspiracy. This was twelve months before the war, and Dr. Karl Buehler, wired that he would do as requested. When the war broke out he received this telegram: "Are you prepared to carry out our agreement with the German government?" His reply was "yes." That goes to show that Germany was making plans for the war in 1913.

We are not complaining that the road to Fairview cost \$4,000 more than was appropriated in last year's budget, but some other locality has been deprived of that amount of road improvement. Our Fairview friends should not forget this if they are inclined to complain. As far as we are concerned we are glad that the county court had the money and finished the hard surfaced road. But suppose the case had been different, and \$4,000 had been expended on the Bayocean road more than was appropriated? The Douglas man would, surely, have had a duck fit and done a whole lot of quack-quack-quacking, and would, probably, have threatened the county court with legal proceedings for it expended more money on the road than had been provided in the budget.

We hope our readers will not think we are cranky, but the snap shot man thinks it is to the best interest of the county to have one school district and one road district. This, we believe, will be adopted before many years. It may be thought to be a most radical move, yet for all that it is a strictly business way to conduct these two branches of the county affairs. When the snap shot man first came to the county there was dozens of road supervisors, who did all the bossing and no work. They were cut out because it was shown that they were an expensive luxury. It may be a little harder to place the school system in the hands of one managing board, for the reason that some people would argue that it was infringing on their rights. How ever that may be, there are many defects that can be pointed out in our present system and many improvements made by only having one managing board.

One would imagine by reading the Wheeler Reporter that the snap shot man was responsible for how the road fund is to be divided between the three road districts next year. It was none of our business to butt in and influence the County Court. All that the "County Oracle" did was simply to give an item of news, which appears to have called for the stereotyped argument about the north part of the county having the largest assessment. We do not dispute the fact that it is exceedingly easy to enter into an argument as to the division of the road funds. As we understand the situation, each of the road districts were to have \$50,000, and the extra \$23,000 was to go into surfacing the main highway south of Tillamook City, and being in road district No. 2, of course, this amount was included in that district. For the information of the Reporter we wish to state that the south part of the county has no railroad, which necessitates heavy travel between this city and Cloverdale, so much so that it is a source of heavy expense to keep this road up with so many autos and heavily loaded auto trucks traveling over that section of the county, especially in the wet season. By building several miles of hard surfaced road some of the maintenance would be eliminated.

The snap shot man is not a stickler where the road funds should be expended, as long as it is expended where it is most needed, and be of most benefit to the people living in the county. It most always happens that one road district needs more money some years than the others, and in that event there should be a give and take spirit; in fact, it is not good business judgment to divide the road money between the three road districts. The County Court is the best judge as to the needs of road improvements in all parts of the county, for it becomes more conversant with local conditions than anyone else, and for that reason we think it is good judgment to leave this matter to the County Court. We are perfectly willing to do so. Another thing we might mention. All who have had any experience in the cost of maintenance of roads know that where travel is heaviest in a county, it takes more money to keep them up. This is the situation right here in the central part of the county. Let us further illustrate this, and we believe that if any road district should receive a larger proportion of the road fund it should be where the roads are mostly used by the settlers and dairymen. We find that in road district No. 1 last year 3,033,068 pounds of milk was produced, while in road district No. 2 it amounted to 24,000,000 pounds, which is a good comparison of the travel over the roads in the two districts. In conclusion, we would like to see the whole county made into one road district and an experienced road builder put in charge of the road work.

A Square Deal for All.

(From Cottage Grove Sentinel)
Brother Flagg, of the Warrenton News, talks of "the howl" being set up by the state press for a "square deal" for capital in Oregon. Brother Flagg gives credit to Gov. Withycombe for originating the idea for showing disapproval of Oregon's manner of discouraging capital from investing in Oregon.

Before Mr. Withycombe was Governor of Oregon the editor of The Sentinel delivered an address before the State Press Association, in which the following language was used:

"Capital is afraid to come to a state that is advertised as the hotbed where experimental legislation is propagated and tried out, capital is afraid of a state that is every other year giving many thousands of votes to experimental tax laws; capital can secure better protection and safer investment elsewhere; our experiments with this, that and the other thing and our efforts to attain an ideal that will never be known in this world are making taxes so high that people accustomed to a much lower tax elsewhere are afraid of us; with commissions to regulate everything from diaphanous grows to translucent religion, we are making it too hard to do business; we are hindering industry about with experimental laws that make the danger and expense of operating so great that our own industries cannot compete in our own state with outside industries; after we have made the cost of production higher in Oregon, after we have made the condition of labor theoretically ideal, we take employment away from that labor by buying from those outsiders who, because they produce under conditions theoretically less ideal—and certainly less expensive—are able to undersell our own industries in our own state; we appear to have only started upon our career of experimental legislation and capital does not care to invest where there is no way of anticipating with future conditions it may have to meet."

"There is no need of my explaining to the country editors of Oregon that where capital does not come laborers are out of business laborers are out of a job, that home seekers do not come to a state to be taxed to death, that farmers do not come to a state where no one else will, and that newspapers cannot thrive in a state where industry is not permitted to prosper."

So Mr. Withycombe was not the originator of this idea. Neither was the editor of The Sentinel the originator.

In the election that followed the month after that meeting of the Association all freak laws were overwhelmingly defeated, thanks to the efforts of the state press. The action of the Oregon State Editorial Association in adopting the resolution which it did adopt, with only Brother Flagg dissenting, shows that it is determined to make Oregon a safe place for capital to invest.

If Brother Flagg wants concrete evidence of an industry, which is the second largest of its kind in the state, and which is ready to quit because of the laws with which it is hedged about, we are ready to name the industry.

Let the good news go out that the editors of Oregon are fighting first, last and all the time for a square deal for capital invested in Oregon, with special advantages to none, and we need not worry about the welfare of our old commonwealth, the greatest in natural resources in the Union.

Notice of Appointment of Viewers For Assessing Damages and Benefits in Laying out Streets

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council, of Tillamook City, Oregon, has appointed Carl Haberlach, David Martiny and T. E. Epplett as viewers, to view the following proposed streets, to-wit: An extension of Tenth Street, or the street platted in A. A. Miller's Addition as Seventh Street, from the west line of Miller's Addition to the West line of Block 46 of Thayer's Addition to Tillamook City as provided for by Ordinance No. 298 of Tillamook City, approved August 3, 1915, and has appointed Friday, the 24th day of December, 1915, at the City Hall, in Tillamook City, Oregon, at the hour of 9 o'clock a.m. as the time and place for said viewers to meet for the purpose of making the assessment of damages and benefits arising out of the proposed extension of said street. All persons claiming damages by reason of the appropriation of any property which will be affected by such proposed extension are hereby notified to file their claims for such damages with the City Recorder of Tillamook City, Oregon, on or before the time so appointed.

The boundaries and termini of the proposed extension, and the boundaries and descriptions of the private property proposed to be appropriated for said extension are as follows:

Beginning at the Southwest corner of Block 14, of A. A. Miller's Addition to Tillamook City, running thence West to the West line of Block 46, Thayer's Addition to Tillamook City; thence South 0 degrees 12 minutes East 60 feet along said West line; thence East to the Northwest corner of Block 16 of A. A. Miller's Addition aforesaid; thence North to the place of beginning.

The private property to be appropriated is all that included within said boundaries, the same consisting of portion of Lots 1, 2 and 3 of Block 46, Thayer's Addition aforesaid, and the tract laying East of said Lot 3 bounded on the West by the East line of said lot and on the North, South and East by the North, South and East boundaries of the tract to be appropriated, being a tract 60 feet North and South by 53.3 feet East and West.
