Agricultural Extension Work in Tillamook County.

In reviewing the work in Tillamook County, it is well to first glance at the agricultural conditions as they exist. The area of the county is approximately 270,000 acres of which only 94.493 or 13.1 per cent is farming lands. Only 32.2 per cent of this farm land is improved. This unimproved, unproductive land constitutes one of the drawbacks of the farming situation. No cheap method of clearing this land and bringing it under cultivation has ever been found.
