Doom of British Free-Trade.

According to the report of United States Consul C. M. Hitch, at Nottingham, England, there is a growing demand for a larger measure of protection than that which is granted in the recently adopted British budget. The counsel says:

"Since the introduction of the budget law in parliament, providing for the levying of customs duties on certain additional articles imported into the United Kingdom, there has developed a strong sentiment in Nottingham in favor of a tariff on cotton and silk laces and embroideries. The Chamber of Commerce has taken the matter in hand and, through its chairman, has made strong representations to the chancellor of the exchequer. The two main arguments relied upon by the advocates of a tariff are (1) That laces and embroideries are luxuries and therefore should be heavily taxed, especially at this time, in the interest of economy and to discourage as far as possible the importation of foreign goods; (2) that the lace industry of Nottingham has been seriously affected by the war, and foreign laces should therefore be taxed in order to protect home industries."

Now that the Free-Trade barrier has been to some extent broken down by the protective duties embodied in the budget for 1915, the clamor for fair Protection is certain to increase. There is no manner of doubt that Protection will be enforced as against competing products from countries now at war with Great Britain. The complete end of British Free-Trade will come with the end of the war. Then there will be no civilized nation on earth that clings to Free-Trade.

Money in the Nation's Pocket.

It would be money in the nation's pocket if every few years business could avoid the paralyzing ordeal of a strictly partisan tariff revision.—Philadelphia Public Ledger.

Isn't that a rather too sweeping statement? Doesn't it depend altogether on what kind of a strictly partisan tariff revision we get? Take, for illustration, the strictly partisan revision of 1897—the Dingley Tariff. Did that take any money out of the nation's pocket. Would a strictly partisan revision of the present Free-Trade Tariff take any money out of the nation's pocket? The Public Ledger knows perfectly well that it would greatly increase the nation's wealth and prosperity. Every Tariff revision is strictly partisan. It has to be. The Ledger, like all the tariff commission advocates, deals in generalities which will not bear analysis.

Tariff as a Safeguard for Trade.

New England manufacturers, representing all sections of the East, met in Boston the other day and adopted a resolution declaring that the "Underwood-Simmons Tariff has failed as a revenue producer" and advocating "an adequate Protective Tariff" as a safeguard against European competition after the close of the war.

That tells the story in a few words. No one can doubt but that it represents the sentiment which prevails in all of the manufacturing centers of the United States.

We are on the verge of a movement that must lead to adequate military and naval protection against any possible foreign invasion from the same quarter. Secretary Garrison says reproachfully that some of the far western states are not enthusiastic for preparedness, because they think they are too far away to be injured in case of an invasion. Some non-manufacturing states feel that way about the tariff. The views are wrong in each case and show a lack of patriotism, because both in the matter of war and commerce an injury to one is the concern of all.

United we are invincible, but divided we are bound to be weak and at the mercy of invaders.—Philadelphia Inquirer.

Printing Point Does Not Bob Up and Down

In an L. C. Smith & Bros. Typewriter the point on the paper which is to receive the type impression is stationary at the instant the type hits. The carriage does not bob up and down when the shift is made to write capitals.
