RAIN AND WIND STORM HITS TILLAMOOK.

River Bottom Land all Under Water.—Scow Breaks Loose from Dock—Bridge Washed out at Nehalem.

The rain and wind storm the first part of the week caused the rivers to overflow inundating the whole of the river bottom lands north of town. The rapid raise of the water on Tuesday afternoon caused some uneasiness, as the water was higher by two feet than the last heavy freshet six years ago. It was Dorothy Slough which caused the most trouble, for the overflow from the Wilson river put the Dorothy slough on a rampage, and it was in that neighborhood where the water reached a higher mark than for many years. Several houses and barns were flooded. This put a stop to travel, as the water rushed across the land and road north of town like a mill stream.

Tuesday evening the water was over the saw mill dock, and railroad track at the mill office five inches. The only inconvenience to the city was the electric light plant being placed out of commission owing to water in the boiler room.

A scow was tied up at the dock of the Coats Lumber Co., loaded with ties, rails and a car for logging, and other things, which broke loose late at night. The scow was recovered the next day in the bay but the load had been dumped off somewhere.

The railroad was put out of commission, the train leaving here Tuesday morning had to remain at Wheeler and the motor at Bay City.

The county bridge across Foley creek, near Clay Daniels was washed out by the freshet on Tuesday. This is not a serious loss to the county as it was the intention of the County Court to put in a new bridge there next year.

Six and a half inches of rain fell Sunday, Monday and Tuesday. The high water on the bottom land insures a large crop of hay next year, for over one inch of sediment have enriched the land.

It may be several days before mail and train service is established. Some piling was washed out from the trussel north of the depot and there are several slides between Wheeler and Timber to be moved. The steam shovel is at Wheeler making repairs, and as soon as this is completed it will be put to work at this end. No mail has arrived in this city since Monday and the train which left Tuesday morning and reached Wheeler will be brought back today with the mail, there being 36 sacks and since then mail has been accumulating at the post office.

The storm paralyzed Christmas trade the first of the week, as it was impossible for people to reach the city by railroad or by the auto stage from the south part of the county, as all travel was suspended. With the weather turning fine, no doubt there will be a big Christmas trade today and to-morrow.

Killed at the Rock Quarry.

Last Sunday morning Herbert J. Duffy, the pit foreman at the Geibish & Joplin rock quarry on the Miami river died from the effects of an accident, after being struck by a slide of rock. Duffy and another man went up the side of the hill and made a preliminary blast, expecting to make a larger blast later. The blast moved more rock than was anticipated, which shot down the hill, carrying Duffy with it, who was buried underneath it. After being extraced he only lived a short while, and died before Dr. Hoy reached the scene of the accident. Coroner Wendt did not think it desirable to hold an inquest after ascertaining the particulars.
