### LIQUOR AFFIDAVITS FILLED WITH TEETH.

Law Provides Four Kinds of Blanks To Cover All Cases.

Here they are. These are the affidavits you will have to sign to get reau of weights and measures and the liquor for any purpose whatever after anuary 1. The afridavits will be filed with the County Clerk and kept on record for your neighbors to look at for two years.

There are four kinds of affidavits: 1. The kind the actual consumer will have to sign to get his two quarts of whisky or wine or his 24 quarts of

beer once in four weeks.

2. The kind ministers and officers of fraternal organizations will fill out to get liquor for sacramental purposes. 3. The kind pharmacists will use when filling perscriptions of alcohol

for medical purposes. 4. The kind pharmacists will have to use for the sale of ethyl alcohol for pharmaceutical, scientific and mechanical purpose and for external

Let's take them up one at a time Notice the affidavit in class one. One must swear that in the last four weeks he has not received from a common carrier such a quantity of liquor as will, with that received on the day of the affidavit, make more that the statutory limit. He must swear it, before the agent of the carrier. Then he must sign a receipt for the use of the car-

The man who wants liquer for sacson who resides in the district as road ramental purposes must swear he is a minister or the commanding officer of the fraternal organization which he represents. His oath must also include the statement made by the man who wants booze for drink, as in afresponsible for the work, with au- fidavit No. 1. The minister or commanding officer must be more than 21 years old and not a habitual drunk-

Notice that in affidavit No. 3 you have to swear that the liquor you is for a medical purpose and that you have to swear what that purpose is. Then you must take your oath the liquor will be used for no other purpose, and that you will not sell it or give it away. bottles are permitted under the law. The authorities are Noah Webster, the Gambrinus brewery, the city buclearly that one may bring into Oregon in any four weeks not more than 24 quarts of beer.

The well-known authority on words and their meaning says a quart is one fourth of a gallon. A gallon of water weighs a trifle more than eight pounds. Therefore a quart would eigh two pounds or 32 ounces. The bureau of weights and measures says beer is slightly heavier than water. So a quart of beer would weigh a lit-

tle more than 32 ounces.

Now comes the Gambrinus brewery. It says there are 21 ounces of beer in what is commonly called the quart bottle. Worked out by geometry, algebra, arithmetic or whatever the system of computation is, the theory of the dopesters is this:

Twenty-four quarts of beer is alowed by the law. One "quart" bottle of beer equals 21 ounces. One standard quart equals 32 ounc-

Thirty-two times 24 divided by 21 equals 36 4-7.

Therefore you can get 36 bottles of beer, within the law.
Q. E. D. Here it is the other way, which makes it appear that you may import 30 bottles of beer every four weeks. The breweries bill five large bottles of beer to the gallon. A quart is a fourth of a gallon. Therefore a regu-lation so-called "quart" bottle of beer holds only 4-5 of a quart. Twenty-four times five divided by four equals 30, which represents the number of bottles you can import if you figure

by the second system. "The law says 24 quarts all right." said District Attorney Evans this morning. "I guess the breweries will have to start putting out beer in full quart bottles to avoid complication."


