Chance, vice-president, H. W. Smith, and A. J. Schmelzer secretary. The corporation also has a manager. A serious accident happened at Brighton on Saturday, which maimed Alfred Magnuson for life. He was working at the saw mill, where his hand was caught in the edge. His arm was drawn in between the rollers to his shoulder stripping the bones of the arm of all flesh and muscles, the bones of the arm, however were not broken. It was found necessary to amputate the arm a few inches below the shoulder, which was done by Dr. Boals and Reinherdt. The bank reports an appreciable increase in deposits and earnings for the past year. A semi-annual dividend of 6 per cent was declared and paid. Captain Farley, of the Coast Guards Station of Bar View, made soundings on Nenaen bar on Monday morning and reports finding not less than a 25 foot depth in the channel. The tide gauge at the time of sounding stood at 9.7 feet, thus giving 15.3 feet on the bar at zero tide. This result is very gratifying to those who have the interests of the bar at heart and it will be a great factor in inducing the lumber interests to begin operations, now that such an excellent depth of water has been provided over the bar. The port officials are especially gratified at the findings and feel that the results obtained are well worth the efforts that have been made towards securing better water transportation facilities.—Wheeler Reporter. The action of the Bay City council in the matter of granting a franchise to the Coast Power Company, will determine whether or not the tentative plans of the Bay City Power plant owners to transfer their property to the Coast Power Company will be carried out. The present franchise which was granted to the Bay City plant provides that the city can at any time purchase the power-plant of that city and this provision will have to be changed before the plans for the transfer of property are completed. No additional extension of the present line will have to be made by the Coast Power Co., as both the Bay City Company and the Coast Power Company have lines running to Idelville, where the connection will be made. Johanna York vs. Southern Pacific Co. is a suit filed in the circuit court in which the plaintiff claims \$25,000 owing to the killing of her husband on the railroad. Plaintiff alleges that on the 17th of March 1915, her husband, Lewis York, was employed as a laborer on the defendant's line, and while doing so was ordered, commanded and required to assist the train crew and to act as a brakeman and to set brakes in setting out cars at what is known and called Miami, which cars were used to transport rocks and like material for the construction and maintenance of the railroad, when the train suddenly, violently and recklessly started and was put in motion with a jerk and lurch the car striking her husband and throwing him under the train, inflicting mortal wounds that resulted in his death. Plaintiff also alleges negligence on the part of the defendant.
